ORDINANCE NO. 2019-147  
Page 2**Section 2. Title.** This ordinance shall be called "The Mindanao Children's Code of 2019".**Section 3. Definition of Terms.**

- a. "Children" refers to persons below eighteen (18) years of age or those over ten but are unable to take care of themselves from abuse, neglect, cruelty, exploitation or discrimination because of physical or mental disabilities or condition;
- b. "Child abuse" refers to the maltreatment, neglect, torture or act of the child which includes the following:
  - 1. Psychological and physical abuse, neglect, cruelty, sexual abuse and emotional maltreatment;
  - 2. Any acts by adults or words which defame, degrades or denigrates the intrinsic worth and dignity of a child as a human being;
  - 3. Unreasonable deprivation of his basic needs for survival, such as food and shelter; or
  - 4. Failure to give immediate medical attention to an injured child resulting in serious impairment of his growth and development or in his permanent incapacity or death;
- c. "Circumstances" which greatly threaten or endanger the physical and moral development of children include but are not limited to the following:
  - 1. Living in a community where there is armed conflict or being affected by armed conflict activity;
  - 2. Working under conditions hazardous to life, safety and health which interfere with their normal development;
  - 3. Living in or staying for breeding in the womb of urban or rural areas without the care of parents or a guardian or basic services needed for a good quality of life;
  - 4. Being a member of a poor family living in a deprived community and/or living under conditions of extreme poverty or in an area which is under developed, under the minimum access to basic services needed for a quality good life;
  - 5. Circumstances analogous to those above stated which endanger the life, safety or moral development of children;
- d. Competencies: program against child abuse, exploitation and discrimination, refers to the coordinated program of services and facilities to protect children's rights.

1. Child protection and sexual abuse;
2. Child trafficking;
3. Obscene publications and indecent shows;
4. Other acts of abuse; and
5. Circumstances which threats or endangering the survival and normal development of children.

**Section 4. Rights of the Child.** (a.) All children shall be entitled to the rights herein set forth without distinction as to the legitimate or illegitimate; sex, social status, religion, political orientation, and other factors.

(b.) All children shall possess the following Rights as classified into survival, development, protection and participative rights:

- Survival Rights - include the inherent right to life, the right to autonomy and nationality, the right to identity and those leading with familial and government duties and obligations, adequate and decent standard of living, access to basic health care and services, social security, rehabilitation;
- Development Rights - refer to access to educational opportunities and relevant information, play, leisure, cultural activities, and rights to freedom of thought, conscience and religion;
- Protection Rights - cover those rights which guard against the protection of children from all forms of abuses, exploitation and discrimination, right to privacy;
- Participative Rights - pertains to the rights of freedom of expression and to have one's views taken into account, involvement in decision-making and consultative processes, freedom of association and assembly.

**Article 2.****LOCAL GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS AND CITIZENS AND PARTICIPATION RIGHTS OF CHILDREN****Section 5. Mandatory Consultation of National Projects and Coordination with agencies.**

- a. Prior to implementation of any national project by any and all national government agencies, bureaus, offices with regards to children, for express approval by the mayor and the sanggunian shall be obtained after holding on the public hearing on the same.

b. for the full implementation of this ordinance and the overall development of all children within the locality, local programs, projects and activities shall be coordinated with, as far as practicable, national government agencies concerned.

**Section 6. Role and Duty of the Local Chief Executive.**

a. the Local Chief Executive, his and on behalf of the local government, shall be responsible for the implementation of this ordinance and the attainment of its stated objectives, provided, that in addition to the duties delegated to and possessed by the local chief executive, he/she is hereby authorized and directed to cause the full implementation of this ordinance as well as to exercise those powers necessary, appropriate, available or essential for the promotion of the survival, development, promotion and participation of children as partners, and the general welfare.

b. in relation to establishments, enterprises, projects and activities which are situated in the authority of the local government, the office of the local chief executive shall take into account of this ordinance in the issuance or cancellation of permits and licenses including insurance, rates or taxation of application. The local chief executive shall be further authorized, after due notice, become investigating, to enter and view the closure of non-complying establishments and enterprises.

c. The local chief executive is further authorized to enter local governments' cooperative arrangements with nearby nearby local governments for mutual benefit and in furtherance of the right of children at each local government.

**Section 7. Role of the Sanggunian Legislative Committee, the Committee on Women and Family Affairs of the Sanggunian Bayan of Mindanao-Norte, Civic, comprised of its chairperson, the president of the Sanggunian ng Sangguniang Kabataan and sanggunian members thereof shall have the following functions and responsibilities:**

1. Formulate, consider and deliberate on proposals, measures and bills affecting children, their survival, protection, development and participation;
2. Conduct periodic public hearings and consultations with appropriate organizations and agencies involved with children; and
3. Receive, process input and recommendations and disagree with the Council of Children.

**Section 8. Creation of the Municipal Council for Children.** (a) There shall be established a Council for Children which shall be composed of the Mayor as chairperson and a representative of an accredited civilORDINANCE NO. 2019-147

governmental organization working for children's protection and development as co-chairperson, the chairperson of the Committee on Women and Family Affairs of the sanggunian, the president of the Sanggunian ng Sangguniang Kabataan in his municipality, a representative of the Department of Social Welfare and Development, one (1) representative from private sector or non-governmental organizations involved in child protection and development as members.

The Municipal Health Office, the Municipal Planning and Development Office, the Public Information Officer and the Chair of Board shall provide the necessary technical assistance to the council.

**b. The Municipal Council for Children shall:**

1. Serve as the Oversight Committee in the monitoring and implementation of this code, and as such, may suggest proposals and submit recommendations for legislative action or policies affecting children;
2. Act as advocacy committee to the sanggunian with respect to children's protection and development and the use of local government for its purpose;
3. Advertise the sanggunian resolution with the assistance of the sanggunian to different fund trustee Special Children's Fund, however, cannot be exceeded with the budget presented;
4. Designate for areas where the specific concern for children as provided in Section 11 hereof shall be addressed and areas where municipal day care centers will be set-up pursuant to Section 11 hereof;
5. Design and undertake education programs for the poorest poor, specific sectors and interest groups, special types of children such as but not limited to working minors, discriminated indigenous people's children, youth offenders;
6. Prepare and present an annual assessment of the implementation of this ordinance to the members of children as provided in Section 9 hereof; and
7. Such other functions as the sanggunian may designate;
8. The council within six (6) months from the effectivity of this ordinance shall formulate a comprehensive program for the life and integral development of the ordinance. This program shall be incorporated in the municipal development plan;
9. Meetings and Quorum: The Council shall meet at least twice a month or as may be necessary to approve resolutions and proposals.



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Labor and Employment and the Office of the Mayor provided. That the following requirements in all instances are strictly complied with:

- (a) The employer shall ensure the protection, health, safety, morals and mental development of the child;
  - (b) The employer shall institute measures to prevent the child's exploitation or discrimination taking into account the interests and level of responsiveness, the abilities and the circumstances of working time; and
  - (c) The employer shall promote and implement, subject to the interests and supervision of competent authorities, a continuing program for training and skills acquisition of the registrants.
- In the above mentioned cases where any such child may be employed, the employer shall file copies, before enrolling each child, with either from the Department of Labor and Employment and the Office of the Mayor which shall ensure observance of the child:
- (d) No person shall employ child models in all advertisements or advertisements promoting alcoholic beverages, intoxicating drinks, tobacco and its products and tobacco.

## Article 4

## SURVIVAL AND DEVELOPMENT RIGHTS OF CHILDREN

Section 17. **Annual Health Care.** The local government shall implement a primary health care program which shall be monitored by the Municipal Health Office in consultation with or assistance of the Department of Health.

Section 18. **Day Care Centers.** - (a) The total development and protection of children program for day care centers shall be provided for children up to six (6) years of age with the consent of parents. Provided, however, that in cases of absent, negligent or impaired children, such centers shall not be required.

(b) The programs shall include the following:

- (1) Monitoring of registration of birth and the completion of the immunization series for prevention of ruberculosis, diphtheria, tetanus, measles, poliomyelitis and such other diseases for which vaccines have been developed for administration to children up to six (6) years of age;
- (2) Growth and nutritional monitoring with supplementary nutrition, feeding and supervision of nutritional needs at home;

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- (c) Care for children of working mothers during the day, and where feasible, care for children up to six (6) years of age when mothers are working at night; provided, that the Day Care Centers must not interfere of children in a particular place but must develop a network of persons who numbers may take care of the children up to six (6) years of age of working mothers during work hours, with adequate supervision from the supervising social welfare office or the Department of Social Welfare and Development;
- (d) Materials and services of surrogate mothers-providers who will provide emotional and moral stimulation to children, as well as supervised educational orientation, with a balance program of supervised play, moral orientation activities, and group activities with peers;
- (e) A center for absent, Neglected or exploited children either in case child protection or the barangay or agency of necessary offices which will take children in legal aid of protection due to a situation which endangers the child or which has exposed the child to injury and abuse;
- (f) A center and support center for pregnant and breast-feeding mothers for prenatal and postnatal care and, in the proper case, for delivery of the infant, under conditions which will receive a minimum aid to mother and child provided, that high-risk mothers shall be referred to the proper hospital or specialized care service provided and children who are at risk from pregnancy or illness will be brought for early, pre-emptive, services that they can start to attend medical services and can respond and continue "alive" so that they are provided the basic basic training for normal delivery and are exposed to negative high-risk pregnancies which should be referred to appropriate obstetrical and pediatric medical care for mother and child interests at risk; and

(g) A support system and network of assistance from among the members of the barangay for the total development and protection of children.

The municipality shall establish day-care centers in areas determined by the Council for Children in coordination with barangays where such centers will be set-up. These centers may be consolidated and jointly operated by the municipality and barangay concerned.

Article 5  
FINAL PROVISIONS

Section 19. **General Penalty.** Violations of any provision of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding Two Thousand Five Hundred

(P. 2,500.00) pesos or 40 implementation fee for a period not exceeding one (1) month, or half of the duration of the craft.

**Section 20. Public Hearing.** This ordinance shall be advertised in a public hearing within every 90 (90) days to solicit comments and recommendations from the public.

**Section 21. Information Dissemination.** The Office of the Municipal Social Welfare and Development and the Office of Mayor is hereby directed to formulate and implement an information program informing the general public and cause the printing and distribution of this ordinance.

**Section 22. Appropriation.** To carry out the provisions of this ordinance and attain the objectives thereof, funds shall be included in the preparation of the annual executive budget a Special Children Fund, an appropriation which shall be used solely for purposes prescribed in this ordinance.

**Section 23. Separability Clause.** If for any reason or reasons, any part or portions of this Ordinance shall be held unconstitutional or invalid, other parts or provisions thereof which are not affected thereby shall continue to be in full force and effect.



**Section 25. Effectivity Clause.** This Ordinance shall take effect upon compliance of its publication and posting in at least two (2) conspicuous places.

The Mendoza-Nufiez Gender and Development Code of 2019

**CHAPTER I  
GENERAL PROVISIONS**

**Article I**

**Title, Statement of Policy and Definition of Terms**

**Section 1. Title:** This ordinance shall be known and cited as the "Gender and Development Code of the Municipality of Mendoza-Nufiez," hereinafter referred to as the GAD Code.

**Section 2. Statement of Policy:**

The GAD Code is an integral Blueprint -- a concrete manifestation of the Municipal government's strong adherence to the tenets of the fundamental democratic principle that men and women in a civil society are equal. This significant initiative is aimed at mainstreaming women's concern, ensure the fundamental equality before the law of men and women, open a wide arena for their active participation now in the development process, and provide women rights and representation equal to that of men.

The several terms of this Code are those defined and declared by the Digital Notaries to wit:

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Page 2

1. Women have the right to the prevention of, and protection from all forms of violence and coercion against their person, their freedom, their sexuality and their individuality.
2. Women have the right to freely and fully participate individually or collectively in the political processes of their communities and nations.
3. Women have the right to the means of securing their economic welfare and security.
4. Women have the right to the maximum possible health care and protection of their reproductive choices according to their health and well-being.
5. Women have the right to choose a spouse in accordance with their values and preferences, mutual respect in marriage, to be dissolved, and obtain adequate support for raising and caring for their children.
6. Women have the right to adequate education, research and gender fair education throughout their lives from childhood to adulthood.
7. Women have the right to pursue their personal and collective, and individually, to reflect an image of themselves in whole and valuable human beings, to build relationships based on respect, trust and mutuality.
8. Women have the right to equality before the law, in principle and in practice.

This Code will provide the Municipal Government's policy directions to formulate programs and strategies that will include, among others,

1. Mainstream gender concerns in all local development plans, policies and programs;

**1. Identify awareness campaign on gender issues and concerns.**

**2. Strengthen Public Private Partnership to maximize the effectiveness of programs and services addressing Gender and Development (GAD) concerns.**

**3. Encourage, support and reward the participation of government agencies in planning, implementation, monitoring and evaluation of development programs and projects.**

**4. Recommended appropriate curriculum at all academic levels that are gender sensitive through passage of legislation.**

**5. Provide gender responsive relief and rehabilitation programs with special focus on women and children's needs.**

**6. Involve men in family planning programs, health and disease prevention, concerns and engage men in projects that enhance the well-being of the family.**

**7. Upgrade and strengthen social intervention centers and shelters in the Municipality of Mendoza-Nufiez for survivors of violence against women and children and other social conflicts.**

**8. Increase the numbers of women in decision and policy making posts at the locality thru implementation of capacity building programs.**

**9. Establish the necessary mechanism to enable women particularly the indigenous people to participate in development programs and gain access to non-traditional sources of livelihood, credit financing, productive skills and labor saving technologies, among others.**

**10. Ensure the contribution of women in all aspects especially in economic development to will be accounted for.**

**Section 3. Definition of Terms**

**1. Barangay Protection Order** – issued or given further acts of violence against a woman and/or her child, and to grant other necessary relief to the purpose of safeguarding the victim from further harm, whenever any disruption in the victim's life and justification for opportunity and safety of the victim to independently regain control of her life.

**2. Bartering** – a series of physical emotional and physical abuse. It is repeated and habitual cyclic pattern or means of intimidation and degradation of the barterer's self and control over the victim's life. It includes the following kind of behavior but is not limited to:

**a. Physical Abuse** – refers to acts that include bodily or physical force.

**b. Sexual Abuse** – this includes physical attacks on the woman's sexual genital or forced sexual activity.

**c. Psychological Abuse** – this includes threats of violence, verbal aggression, name-calling, or banter, passing notes in the walls, threatening to take the children away, threatening deportation of women with foreign citizenship, threatening to kill children or take them to another country, will forcing the victim to do disgusting things, it may also include threatening the victim's social or sexual activities, the use of fear words or statements, and threats of abandonment and separation such as leaving the wife to travel for example travelling. This provision shall likewise apply to common law relationships but does not include relationships as is contemplated in the Revised Penal Code. Protection and removal, distribution of property and pets, usually the victim's property.

**d. Economic Abuse** – this includes deprivation of means of economic resources, their generation and multiplication as to provide dependency and subordination and to any unanticipated consequences of discrimination.

**e. Financial Abuse** – of a person who is financially or sexually harassed to both men and women, or to people of various gender identities, or is raped in both areas.

**f. Collateral Relatives** – next of kin who are not in the direct line of inheritance such as cousins.

**g. Development** – attaining a full and satisfying life for all regardless of age, sex, gender, race, place, creed and religion. It is characterized by an attachment of Filipino indigenous nature of the country and freedom from dependency. It is therefore, sustainable, equitable and gender-responsive.

1. **Discriminative Against Women** – any distinction, exclusion or restriction made on the basis of sex which has the effect or purpose of depriving or reducing the enjoyment, attainment or exercise by women of their rights, irrespective of their marital status.
2. **Empowerment** – refers to a process by which women take control and action in order to overcome the obstacles brought about by structural inequalities. Empowerment means the collective actions of the oppressed and deprived groups to overcome the structures inequalities which have previously put them in disadvantaged position.
3. **Environmental Impact Statement Assessment** – analysis of the impact that a proposed development, usually industrial, will have on the natural and social environment. It includes assessment of long and short effect on the physical environment.
4. **Equality** – is a concept of discriminatory nature which is territorial and is intended to eliminate bias, discrimination and inequalities.
5. **Patriarchalism of Poverty** – a condition where the gap between the rich and the poor widens and women bear the brunt of economic instability and unequal distribution of wealth. Rich pay themselves, entrepreneurs, at both practical and strategic levels of business.
6. **Gender** – is a word that commonly refers to a male whose sexual orientation is different to a person of the same sex.
7. **Gender** – refers to the differentiated social roles, behavior capacities and characteristics, emotional and social characteristics attributed to a given culture to women and men, in short all differences besides the strictly biological.
8. **Gender and Development (GAD)** – refers to a developmental perspective which promotes greater focus on gender both as development agency and participants. It encourages the equal contribution of both women and men in all representations of development. Such a perspective positions the process of creating of new and innovative initiatives which transforms unequal gender relations between women and men. It recognizes that the unequal relations between men and women is a major barrier to social and economic progress. It acknowledges that the difficulties experienced by women have to be addressed to ensure their effective participation in development.

creates a better society where women and men equally contribute to and benefit from development.

Universally recognized perspective which acknowledged that development which affects people differently depending on their class, age, religion, ethnicity and gender. GAD is about being a gender-oriented, women-focused and looks at proper relations between women and men as partners to social and economic progress.

9. **Gender Equality** – a social order in which women and men share the same opportunities and the same obligations on the full participation in both economic and domestic realms. As a key to development, gender equality means the equal empowerment and participation of women, men and other subgroups of society, i.e. homosexuals, in all spheres of public and private life.
10. **Gender Mainstreaming** – refers to the strategies and processes to integrate gender responsive goals in the domestic, political, private and services of agencies. It also ensures the integration of gender concerns in the development agenda to address gender inequalities.
11. **Gender Perspective** – way of viewing issues and problems that take into consideration the different realities of women's and men's lives and recognizing that there is an unequal relationship between the two.
12. **Gender Planning** – means taking account of gender issues in planning using a tool of gender analysis. In development planning, it means that gender issues are recognized in the identification of problems and addressed in development perspective.
13. **Gender Sensitive Responses** – having an understanding of the marginalised position of women and consciously addressing the attitudes and behavior that sustain women's subordinate status.
14. **Gender Sensitization** – is an experimental and critical process of learning and examining of an individual female or male of the causes and effects of the culturally determined role of the women and men.
15. **Gender Sensitivity Training** – means providing persons with formal learning experience in order to increase their awareness. The overall purpose of the training is to provide the knowledge and skills necessary to recognize and address gender issues in the programming process. At the center of the learning process is the comprehension involving the availability to recognize the underlying issues of gender equality which form a precursor substrate to program progress.

16. **Hazardous Child Labor** – work which, by its nature or circumstances in which it is carried out, is likely to harm the health, safety or morals of children.

More specifically, hazardous child labor is work in dangerous or unhealthy conditions that could result in a child being killed or injured, or made ill as a consequence of poor working and health conditions, or working arrangements. Some forms of child labor may result in permanent disability.

17. **Human Trafficking** – Trafficking in Persons – refers to the recruitment, transportation, transfer or harboring in excepts of persons, with or without the victim's consent or knowledge within or across national borders by means of threat or use of force or other forms of coercion, abduction, fraud, deception, abuse of power or position, using payment, promises, threat, coaxing, abuse of the person in the giving or receiving of advantages or benefits to achieve the consent of the person being exploited, over another person for the purpose of exploitation, which includes, at a minimum, the exploitation or prostitution of others, or other forms of sexual exploitation, sexual labor or services, or other methods in the exercise or route of organ.

It is a crime in which men, women and children are considered invaluable properties and objects of exchange.

18. **Indigenous Cultural Communities Indigenous People** – refers to a group of people or homogeneous section separated by self-organization or others who have continuously used as spiritual, community or other cultural activities are defined similarly and who have under certain circumstances formed one common historical, associated economic, political and other distinctive cultural traits, or who have, through resistance to political, social and cultural invasion or domination, kept indigenous religious and culture. Native Americans differentiated from the majority of Filipinos 2000% who likewise include persons who are regarded as indigenous on account of their descent from the population which inhabited the country at the time of conquest or colonization, or at the time of formation of national independent states, or the inhabitants of precolonial state boundaries, who never became citizens, or the descendants of persons who have been citizens since or at all of their prior social, economic, cultural and political institutions, but who may have been displaced from their traditional domains or who may have moved outside their ancestral domains.

19. **Kawanihan** refers to any person who assumes elements in developing and maintaining an employee in family, social, health, economic, civic, professional, and other areas of his/her life.

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"Kawanihan" or "Assumes to help" shall be used in the context of "Assume" to properly signify the worth of the job of a house helper.

20. **Land-based Project** – an income-generating intervention to provide women the opportunity to have full access and control over the ownership of land and other indigenous resources.
21. **Landless** – a person who owned no land or less than 10 hectares.
22. **Minor** – refers to persons below 18 years of age who are unable to take care of themselves from their legal, spiritual, educational, or administrative, financial, welfare, medical, and other needs.
23. **Other Plans of Assessment** – include all other plans of assessment for household assessments or otherwise provided in or by the law, issued but not limited to right side of the table, which includes a copy of MDR-CBAs, Local Income, Household Budgeting, Social Security Benefits, Health Services, Nutritious Meals, Family Planning, and other basic services which are often assessed or planned under the category of local participation. Private houses among others to be checked prior to assessment.

24. **Persons with Disabilities** – are members of physical disabilities as well as functional such as sensory include those who have total or partial physical, mental, intellectual or sensory disabilities which are in interaction with various factors can reduce their full and effective participation in society in equal basis with others.

25. **Places of Assessment** – include houses, homes, apartment buildings and other places of assessment where one may determine if income should be recognized for the three of performances.

26. **Photographic Series, Patterns, Publications** – series or group of other forms of communications intended to inform the public.

27. **Presentation** – is the sale, purchase and exchange of services, goods or services for remuneration for each project or other specific consideration. It is individual, including but not limited to giving, giving away, giving to service projects, events of multifunctional hall, restaurants and restaurants, and any other services who uses certain services to present workers and visitors. It is the act as defined under the Law and Civil Code of the Philippines and shall be recognized as a violation of

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Human rights and exploitation of women who have no real choices for survival.

**33. Reproductive Health** - is a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being and not merely the absence of disease and infirmity, in all matters relating to the reproductive system and to its function and processes. It constitutes 10 elements namely:

1. Maternal and Child Health and Nutrition
2. Family Planning
3. Prevention and Treatment of Reproductive Tract Infection (RTI) including STD, HIV and AIDS
4. Prevention and Management of Abortion
5. Education and Counseling on Sexuality and Sexual Health
6. Prevention and Treatment of Infertility and Sexual Disorders
7. Men's Reproductive Health
8. Violence against Women
9. Adolescent Reproductive Health
10. Sex Trafficking

**34. Safe Home/Half-way Center** - a house or building used as a living place or temporary shelter for victims of abuse.

**35. Sexism** - is one's total expression of pessimism on the basis of self-appreciation (body, mind and lineage) and satisfaction of needs, are considered as physical expression of intense relationship with others through various life stages.

**36. Sexual Harassment** - is a form of misconduct involving an act or a series of actions sexual advances, request for sexual favors, or other verbal or physical behavior of a sexual nature, made directly, indirectly or implied.

**37. Sole Parent** - any individual who falls under any of the following categories:

1. A woman who gives birth as a result of rape and other crimes against humanity even without a legal conviction of the offender; Provided, That the mother keeps and raises the child.
2. Parent left solo or alone with the responsibility of parenthood due to death of spouse;
3. Parent left solo or alone with the responsibility of parenthood while the spouse is detained or is serving sentence for a criminal association for at least one (1) year;
4. Parent left solo or alone with the responsibility of parenthood due to physical and/or mental incapacity of spouse as certified by a public medical practitioner;

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5. Parent left solo or alone with the responsibility of parenthood due to legal separation or de facto separation from spouse for at least one (1) year, as long as he/she is uninsured with the custody of the children.

6. Parent left solo or alone with the responsibility of parenthood due to incapacity of male or incapable of raising his/her child by himself or by a couple as long as he/she is uninsured with the custody of the children.

7. Parent left solo or alone with the responsibility of parenthood due to incapacity of spouse for at least one (1) year.

8. Unwed mother (who has no parental care and care for his/her children instead of having a other care or does not give them up to another institution).

9. Any other person who solely provides parental care and care for a child or children.

10. Any family member who assumes the responsibility of head of family as a result of the death, abandonment, disappearance or prolonged absence of the parent or wife/groom.

**38. Transgender** - is a generic term applied to a variety of individuals, behaviors, and groups regarding tendencies of being from extremely conventional gender roles.

**39. Violence Against Women and their children** - any act of gender-based violence that results in or is likely to result in physical, sexual or psychological harm or suffering to women, including threats of such acts, coercion or arbitrary deprivation of liberty, whether occurring in public or private life. It shall include but not limited to:

1. Physical, sexual and psychological violence occurring in the family and other close relationships, including forcing, sexual abuse of female children in the household, discriminatory violence, marital rape, female genital mutilation and other traditional practices harmful to women, non-spousal violence and violence related to exploitation.
2. Physical, sexual and psychological violence occurring within the general community, including rape, sexual abuse, sexual harassment and intimidation at work, in educational institutions and elsewhere, trafficking in women and forced prostitution.
3. Physical, sexual and psychological violence perpetrated or condoned by the State, whenever it occurs.

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4. Other acts of violence against women to include:

- violation of the human rights of women in situation of armed conflict, in particular wartime, systematic rape, sexual slavery and forced pregnancy.
- forced sterilization and forced abortion, coercive-limited use of contraceptives, prenatal sex selection and forced infanticide
- discrimination of poverty.

**40. Wellness Centers** - facilities having programs intended to promote and maintain a state of physical well-being for optimal performance and health.

#### Article II Creation of Barangay and Municipal Gender and Development Committees and their Functions

##### Section 4. Barangay and Municipal GAD Budget

2. Create and establish systems in surveillance, investigation and ensure its more effective and efficient coordination;
3. Institute policies and programs to prevent women and children victims of trafficking and violence;
4. Establish information, education and advocacy campaign against trafficking in persons and UAWC.

#### **Section 11. Enhanced Participation of Men in the Protection of Women's Rights**

The Municipal Government of Minalan and, through Gender and Development Office (GAD), design and support programs and activities to educate and sensitize men on their roles and responsibilities in the protection of Women's Rights. The MELDO shall ensure implementation of Family Welfare Program to reinforce men as effective partners of women in family building.

#### **Section 12. Programs for Survivors of Violence**

The Municipal Government of Minalan shall:

1. Take particular interest in providing opportunities for employment in women sectors of agriculture and others;
2. Allocate funds for enhancement programs for women income-generators and conduct gender responsive livelihood skills

#### **Section 19. Economic Independence of Women and Men with Disabilities**

The Municipal Government of Minalan, together with the Women Care for Disabled Persons, shall encourage the empowerment of women and men with disabilities in order to protect and promote their rights and contribute their contribution in the attainment of socio-economic development.

#### **Section 20. Tradition and Support Systems for all Employees.**

The Municipal Government of Minalan shall ensure the safety and health of women employees. The emphasis is appropriate work-life.

1. Establish separate child rooms, latrines for men and women and provide at least a dressing room for women;
2. Establish WomenCare Center in the workplace to implements care mechanisms, child caring and early childhood care for working mothers while in their respective job.

#### **Section 21. Monitoring System for Labor Standards**

A committee shall be established in the Integrated Population, Gender and Development Office to monitor all offices, agencies and instrumentalities or companies violating the Labor Code, the provisions of the Code and existing laws.

#### **Section 22. Employment Assistance Programs**

The Municipal Government of Minalan, in cooperation with the Department of Labor and Employment and the Public Employment Service Office (PESO) shall endeavor to assist poor families, the unemployed and the underemployed in securing gainful employment.

#### **Section 23. Municipal-Based Registration of Householders/Kaumabuhay**

All the 24 barangays in the Municipality shall come up with an annual survey of domestic helpers in their respective barangays to monitor cases of sexual harassment, sexual abuse and other forms of maltreatment. Household shall be required to solve their householders/kaumabuhay for identification and for other programs. Employers must provide their householders/kaumabuhay

The Municipal Government of Minalan shall:

2. Encourage, representativeness and active participation of women in provincial, municipal and barangay associations;
3. Provide and facilitate avenue to broaden mass participation of women, thus, contributing to the realization of its vision and mission.

#### **Section 26. National Women's Month Declaration of Minalan for WOMEN'S Day**

Based on the Declaration of the United Nations, March of every year shall be observed as National Women's Month and March 8 as Women's Day. Through an issuance of an Executive Order by the Municipal Mayor, A Women's Month shall be held every March, where issues and concerns relative to the welfare of the promotion and protection of women's health, Women's Day and Women's Month shall be convened and organized by the Municipal Social Welfare and Development Office.

#### **Section 27. National Children's Month**

Based on Proclamation No. 20 Declaring the month of October Every Year as the National Children's Month in Recognition of the Filipino Children as the Most Precious Asset of the Nation and their Vital Role in Nation-Building pursuant to Sec. 12, Art. 2 of the Constitution. Since September 26, 1982, the Municipality of Minalan shall observe the month of October as National Children's Month and celebrate programs, activities and activities in the observance of the National Children's Day. SECTION 1. TITLE. The Charter Act is hereby adopted by the Mandaue  
2019-2023, and the Charter Law of the Mandaue, Cavite

SECTION 2. RELAXATION OF POLICY. It shall be the policy of the

5. The existing enterprise, as stated in investor statement and recent tax returns for the past three (3) years; and
6. Other documents as may be required by the Board.

b. Payment of assessment fee (P2,000.00) based on the size of the proposed investment. Provided, that if the investment registration specified under Section 19 of this Article has been filed, a credit will be given.

**SECTION 20. GENERAL INCENTIVE.** General Incentive shall be given for the purpose of making the incentive available to projects which do not qualify under the following:

**SECTION 22. FINANCIAL INSPECTION.** The Financial Inspection Board shall conduct an annual inspection of the participating incentives of local enterprises which are in the process of receiving a local government agency to inspect the status and code observance shall be issued to the local government component of the Municipal Budget Law or in the interests of the Board, and all findings present in front of the respective Local Government Component.

**CHAPTER VI**

**INCENTIVE AND PRIVILEGE AREA**

**SECTION 27. INCENTIVE AND PRIVATE AREA.** The Municipality of Marinduque retains all registered incentive in the fulfillment of the rights and privileges provided by the law and the Constitution, does the Board, no:

i. Provide review and comprehensive evaluation in prospective interest regarding the economic priorities of the province, large industrial areas and the general conditions applicable in assessing their private investments;

ii. Encourage as incentives and the general public, the systematic evaluation criteria and registration procedure to achieve maximum participation in the process of granting incentives;

iii. Take into account the need of incentives for industrial zones, identify grants and grants to state operated, industrial parks and/or industrial and medium offering incentives in the province;

iv. Facilitate implementation of the incentive project;

v. Encourage or modify entrepreneurs with incentives plus the details for the implementation of an investment project has been accepted and agreed, and the existing and management structure of an entrepreneur has been established before the same provide otherwise.

**CHAPTER VII**

**INCENTIVE TO REGISTERED ENTERPRISES**

**SECTION 28. FISCAL INCENTIVES.** The Investment Incentive Program shall apply to new businesses which acquire and own land operations after the approval of the application and those existing businesses planning to expand their operations shall receive the privilege granted by this program for a period as may be determined as the basis of the amount of investments put up by the investors under the following standards:

**SECTION 29. TAX INCENTIVE INCENTIVES.** As qualified and accepted applicants to the Investment Incentive Program shall enjoy the following Tax Incentives, amongst for a period equal to Section 1 of this Article and 10 years:

i. Exemption from payment of P10,000.00 less of the total Property Tax. This exemption is limited to 100% less of the property taxes due on the business unit;

ii. Exemption from payment of all municipal business and permit fees. However, an application in the Investment Incentive Program are still required to secure the Mayor's Permit and any other permits necessary to conduct their business;

iii. Exemption from paying of the assessment fees or construction fees or fees on the issuance of the construction of factory building or the business unit until such time the business operation shall have started. Construction fees shall not exceed five (5) years;

**SECTION 30. NON-FISCAL INCENTIVES.** Local incentives include subsidies, support and assistance from the local Government Unit, members of the Board, or members of the legislature or local government of Marinduque, including of right-of-way, including buildings in the event of emergency and disaster. Provided however that these rights are non-transferable.

**SECTION 31. LAW APPLICABILITY.** The incentives granted under this Ordinance shall also apply to mining, quarrying and leasing activities, which are governed by the Mineral Leasing Act and under the supervision of the Mineral Leasing Office.

**SECTION 32.** The incentives and privileges granted by the registered members of the local government bodies, ordinances are non-transferable, except in the event of death or permanent incapacity of a participant member where the survivors and beneficiaries shall be designated in the form of affidavit in accordance with law or succession if the applicant is a minor person. Migrant, communication, heirs and the like of participants shall be decided in a case-by-case basis by the Board, provided that when such beneficiaries are able to articulate, the organization will instruct the beneficiaries, then such incentives can be treated as an extending members.

**CHAPTER VIII**

**MANDATED APPROPRIATION**

In order for the Municipal Investment Board to operate effectively ultimately serve the purpose for which it was created, an initial amount of TWENTY THOUSAND PESOS (P20,000.00) shall be appropriated and shall be taken from the Municipal Internal Revenue Allocation and the Development Fund.

WHEREAS, The Municipality of Mendez, Batangas adopted Ordinance No. 94-02 for the Code of Public Safety for Local Ordinances providing guidelines for safety in local celebration and events in the municipality;

WHEREAS, The same Code lacks the necessary guidelines pertaining the place for the use, distribution and the venue specifically targeted or mandated by the DECA in holding such celebration and distribution;

WHEREAS, The Municipal Mayor issued the corresponding Executive Order for the declaration of cause and permitting requirements for the sale and distribution of firecrackers, pyrotechnic devices and other similar products in the municipality;

Now, Therefore, We, it Deemed by the Sangguniang Bayan of Mendez, Batangas, Batangas;

**SECTION 1. Title.** This ordinance shall be known as "An Ordinance Governing the Price and Value for the Selling, Manufacturing and Regulating the Sale, Distribution, Possession and the Use of Firecrackers, Pyrotechnic Devices and Other Similar Explosives Within the Territorial Jurisdiction of the Municipality of Mendez, Batangas, Province of Cavite."

**SECTION 2. Relation to Prior Ordinance.** The provisions of this ordinance which are substantially the same with existing ordinances relating to the subject matter shall be construed as renounced and not as now re-enacted unless otherwise explicitly modified.

**SECTION 3. Prohibition on the Price and Value for the Selling, Manufacturing and Regulating the Sale, Distribution, Possession and the Use of Firecrackers, Pyrotechnic Devices and Other Similar Explosives.**

a. Manufacturing of Firecrackers, Pyrotechnic Devices and Other Similar Explosives shall be done on sound location.

b. The place and cause for the selling, distribution and the use of firecrackers and other similar devices shall be in the old basketball court located at the municipal plaza.

c. The sale or distribution of firecrackers, pyrotechnics or others are prohibited.

d. Handling of firecrackers, pyrotechnics and similar device shall be done by authorized persons.

**SECTION 4. Issuance of Permits.** Any individual, group or organization intending to hold celebration with firecrackers, pyrotechnic devices and fireworks display shall receive permit from the Office of the Municipal Mayor at least fifteen (15) days before the actual conduct of affairs accompanied with detailed action plan of the celebration.

**SECTION 5. Penalties.** Failure to comply with any provision of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than P. 1,000.00 nor not more than P. 2,000.00 or by imprisonment of one (1) month or both at the discretion of the court.

**SECTION 6. Cancellation of Permits.** Any individual, group or organization found violating any provision of this ordinance shall be subject to cancellation of their permits.

**SECTION 7. Any ordinance which are inconsistent with the provision of this ordinance in whole or in part is hereby repealed or modified accordingly.**

**SECTION 4. Participation of concerned Entities.** All concerned entities are highly encouraged to extend their utmost cooperation and contribute their share to ensure the successful implementation of this ordinance.

- a) Every business establishment is required to put up a trash bin or waste bin for their solid waste.
- b) Fish, meat and vegetable vendors inside the public market are also required to put up trash bins or waste bins to assist all or tender their staff to be managed and arranged by the market administrators.
- c) Public Utility vehicles such as jeepneys and tricycles to place a trash bin inside their vehicles.
- d) The barangay shall likewise put up trash bins, waste bins or garbage receptacles in strategic places within the barangay to make easy, convenient and accessible for the public to place or deposit their waste items.

**SECTION 5. Funding.** To carry out the provision of this Ordinance, the owner of PWD shall be taken from any available appropriation for supplies and materials for the putting of the Ordinance in fullness, in strategic and conspicuous places within the community.

**SECTION 6. Penal Provision.**

- a. Any person who is caught violating section 3 of this Ordinance shall be penalized with the following:
 

First Offense	- P. 500.00 or an hour community service
Second Offense	- P. 1,000.00 or an hour community service
Third Offense	- P. 2,500.00 or imprisonment of not exceeding two days or look at the discretion of the court.
  - b. In the event that the violator is caught by the barangay, any barangay official, City personnel (50%) of the fine shall accrue to the general fund of the concerned barangay or the community service rendered right in the said barangay. Provided, however, that income derived out of the enforcement of the ordinance shall be utilized exclusively for clean and green program.
- SECTION 7. Exemptions.** Except as otherwise provided in this ordinance, the following person shall be exempted from the coverage of this Ordinance, specifically on the penal provision:
- a. Persons who are mentally sick, retarded and those showing signs of having mental disfunction.
  - b. Children below six (6) years old, however, if the child is under supervision by an adult, the latter shall be held responsible and accountable.

4. Children from 6 to 12 years old caught violating this ordinance shall be apprehended and brought to the Pasong Parang, or in its absence, to any barangay. Kidnap and other serious cases shall be reported and concerned immediately for a coordination concern on the issue and importance of cleanliness and sanitation, potential discipline and the need to consult with the premises of the ordinance. The offending minor shall not be released without the presence of his/her parents or guardian.

**SECTION 8. Repealing Clause.** All Ordinances, Resolutions or Decisions which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed, amended or modified accordingly.

**AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING PROPER HAND-WASHING FACILITIES AND RESTROOMS IN ALL CANTINES, RESTAURANTS AND OTHER FOOD SERVING ESTABLISHMENTS WITHIN THE MUNICIPALITY OF MENDEZ, LAGUNA, CASTLE AND FRESH RIVER, PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF**

WHEREAS, it is the policy of the municipality to promote the health and welfare of its citizens;

WHEREAS, it is a necessity for every instance of cantines, restaurants and other food serving establishments to set a clean place for hand-grown hygiene;

WHEREAS, having a proper hand-washing area works by decreasing the transmission of disease such as diarrhea (which includes typhoid and cholera), acute respiratory infections, cold infections, among other diseases;

WHEREAS, the right of the general public to a clean and healthy environment can be assured by mandating all cantines, restaurants and other food serving establishments to have a proper hand-washing area and restroom;

WHEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED, in P.A. manner, BY THE HONORABLE BOARD OF MUNICIPAL OFFICERS OF MENDEZ, LAGUNA, CASTLE AND FRESH RIVER, PHILIPPINES, THIS TWENTY-THREE (23) DAY OF DECEMBER, TWO THOUSAND FOURTEEN:

Section 1. Title. - This ordinance shall be known as "THE HAND-WASHING FACILITIES AND RESTROOMS IN ALL CANTINES, RESTAURANTS AND OTHER FOOD SERVING ESTABLISHMENTS WITHIN THE MUNICIPALITY OF MENDEZ, LAGUNA, CASTLE AND FRESH RIVER".

Section 2. Definition of Terms. - In this ordinance, the following terms shall mean and be construed to have the following respective meanings:

- a. Hand-washing Station - a clean and safe station;
- b. Restroom - a clean and safe place for toilet;
- c. Castle - a town in the province of Laguna, in the Philippines, situated in the middle of Lake Bulacan;
- d. Municipal - a local government unit, which has been established and incorporated;
- e. Other food serving establishment - such as, but not limited to, bars,

Section 3. Penalty. - Any violation or cause of the non-compliance found during the inspection shall be liable to pay the following:

First Offense	P. 100.00
Second Offense	P. 200.00
Third Offense	P. 500.00 and cancellation of permit.

Section 4. The Municipal Health Office shall promulgate such rules and regulations, with the approval of the Office of the Mayor, or as necessary, for the effective implementation of this ordinance.

Section 5. The Municipal Health Office and the ABC shall make the public aware of this ordinance by conducting public forum, news or information dissemination and posters.

Section 6. Repealing Clause. - All ordinances, rules, regulations or parts thereof, whose provisions are in conflict or contrary to the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed, amended or modified accordingly.

### "An Ordinance Establishing a Comprehensive Nutrition Program in Mandaue, Cebu"

WHEREAS, it is the policy of the Municipality to provide the appropriate nutrition to all sectors in support of the promotion of health and optimum functional performance;

WHEREAS, it is also the intent of the Sanggunian Bayan to establish the Local Nutritional Improvement Program (LNIP) to improve the quality of life of the citizens of Mandaue by improving the delivery of basic services, one of the pillars of LNIP;

WHEREAS, in the LNIP, several interventions to total human development programs will be put in terms of outcomes, including delivery of the recommended services to the training and nurturing of children under 5 years of age, the nutritional needs of pregnant and lactating women and other persons;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED, in the Senate INACTED by the Sanggunian Bayan of Mandaue, Province of Cebu, by the virtue of the powers so hereby by law, it enacts as follows:

#### ARTICLE I

##### TITLE, POLICY, PRINCIPLES AND DEFINITION OF TERMS

**SECTION 1. TITLE.** This ordinance shall be known as the MANDAEUE COMPREHENSIVE NUTRITION PROGRAM ORDINANCE.

**SECTION 2. DECLARATION OF POLICY.** The Municipal Government of Mandaue shall promote the right and welfare of its people as a vital part of human development and optimum function. It recognizes that all nutritional interventions should be anchored to the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) 2030 and the Philippine Plan of Action for Nutrition 2017-2022 in improving the quality of human resource base of the country.

The Local Government of Mandaue-Norda aims to strengthen its social welfare through programs that shall end all forms of malnutrition, including achieving the internationally agreed targets in training and nurturing of children under 5 years of age and address the nutritional needs of pregnant girls, pregnant and lactating women and other persons, through:

- Increasing the agricultural productivity and income of smallholder food producers, family farmers and other productive members and agents, knowledge, financial services, markets and opportunities for value addition and non-farm employment;
- Ensuring sustainable food production systems and implements relevant agricultural practices that increase productivity and production, thus helping communities that strengthen capacity for adaptation to climate change, extreme weather, drought, flooding and other disasters and that progressively improves land and soil quality;
- Adapting measures to ensure the proper functioning of local commodity markets and their derivatives and facilitate timely access to market information, including on food reserves, in order to help limit extreme food price volatility; and
- Assessing quality essential health-care services and access to safe, effective, quality and affordable essential medicines and vaccines for all.

**SECTION 3. DEFINITION OF TERMS.** For the purpose of this ordinance the following terms are hereby defined:

- a) **Breast milk substitute** means any food being marketed or otherwise represented as a partial or total replacement for breast milk, whether or not suitable for that purpose;
- b) **Complementary food** means any food, whether manufactured or locally prepared, suitable as complement to breast milk, whether or not suitable for that purpose;
- c) **Exclusive breastfeeding** means providing breast milk as the sole source of nutrition for infants;
- d) **Infant formula** refers to breast milk substitute formulated substantially to meet the normal nutritional requirements of infants up to six months age and adapted to their physiological characteristics;
- e) **Lactation Stations** refers to a private, clean, sanitary and well-ventilated room installed in the workplace or public places where nursing mothers can feed or breastfeed or express their milk comfortably and therefor afterwards.

i) Food fortification refers to the addition of micronutrients such as Vitamin A, iron and iodine to food, whether or not they are normally contained in the food for the purpose of preventing or correcting nutritional deficiency, with one or more vitamins to the population or specific subpopulation groups;

ii) Philippine Plan of Action for Nutrition or PPAN 2017-2022 refers to the national government's strategic plan to contribute in improving the quality of the human resource base of the country and to have substantial decreases in child and maternal and infant disease burden;

#### ARTICLE 2

##### PROGRAMS AND SERVICES FOR NUTRITION

**SECTION 4. NUTRITION PROGRAMS AND SERVICES.** The LGU Mandaue shall implement and review the Nutritive Programs and Services. It shall adopt the nutrition framework of the Department of Health and other nutrition-related models that can best prove cost-effective in address malnutrition.

**4.1 PROMOTION OF INFANT AND YOUNG CHILD FEEDING.** The LGU shall advocate and promote infant and young feeding through early initiation within one (1) hour after child birth, exclusive breastfeeding for six (6) months and continuation of breastfeeding up to two (2) years onwards in various settings like home, institutions, Early Childhood Centers, hospitals, nutrition clinics and workplace to ensure safe and adequate nutrition for all infants and young child. It shall implement interventions such as follows:

1. Organizational and institutional capacity building of community-based or household infant and young children, groups or organizations on infant and young child feeding;
2. Training health and nutrition workers, including those in feeding facilities and in schools, emphasizing on infant and young child feeding;
3. Setting up lactation stations in the workplace, under government or private establishments and feeding centers;
4. Implementation of the MNL Code on the Marketing of Breast Milk Substitutes (BMS);
5. Health facilities or implementation NGO through the use of nutrition intervention service;
6. Conduct IYC activities in Infant and Young Child Feeding (IYCF)-newborn especially during breastfeeding month observance in August (BMO);
7. Integration of IYCF concerns in the nutrition of primary and secondary education;

**4.2 MATERNAL AND CHILD CARE PROGRAM.** The LGU shall implement and review Maternal Child Care Program which shall aim to the health of which affects the child in the womb with the goal in the view of delivering a healthy birth.

**AN ORDINANCE IMPLEMENTING A ONE WAY TRAFFIC SCHEME IN THE CITY OF TAGAYTAY DURING WEEKENDS, HOLIDAYS AND SPECIAL EVENTS**

WHEREAS, due to the increased influx of vehicles and tourists, the City of Tagaytay has been experiencing traffic congestion during weekends and holidays;

WHEREAS, the Tagaytay Office of Public Safety conducted a dry run of the One Way Traffic Scheme covering the Tagaytay Nasugbu Road from the intersection of Tagaytay Nasugbu Road and J.P. Rizal Avenue (Mahogany Avenue) (Hagdang Bato) and intersection of J.P. Rizal Avenue from the intersection of Tagaytay Nasugbu Road and JP Rizal (Petron Gas Station) during the recent Lenten season and surrounding weekends, the implementation of which has consistently yielded the desired positive result;

NOW THEREFORE, upon motion of Hon. Claro C. Batino seconded by Hon. Salvador P. Umaran, be it ordained by the Sanggunian Panlungsod of Tagaytay that:

**SECTION 1.** This ordinance shall be known as "One Way Traffic Scheme Ordinance" of Tagaytay City.

**SECTION 2.** The following re-routing scheme shall be implemented in the City of Tagaytay during weekends, holidays and during special events from 6:00 am to 10:00 pm:

All vehicles from Manila and base bolosano Avenue (through Tagaytay-Cabatuan Road) going to the Western portion shall take the J.P. Rizal Avenue (Mahogany Avenue) (Hagdang Bato) and Crisanto Delos Reyes Avenue (Akle Street) and take a U-turn at Hagdang Bato (intersection of J.P. Rizal Avenue and Tagaytay Nasugbu Road going to Tagaytay Nasugbu Road).

All PUJs and PUAs from the said communities and Nasugbu going to the Western portion shall take the J.P. Rizal Avenue (Mahogany), and may take a U-turn at Hagdang Bato (intersection of J.P. Rizal Avenue and Tagaytay Nasugbu Road going to Tagaytay Nasugbu Road).

All vehicles from Alfonso, Indang and Mender going to the Eastern

portion shall take the Tagaytay Nasugbu Road, however, may take a left turn at Akle Street and Crisanto Delos Reyes Avenue or may take a U-turn at Petron Station (intersection of J.P. Rizal Avenue and Tagaytay Nasugbu Road going to J.P. Rizal Avenue).

All PUJs and PUAs from Batangas, Alfonso, Indang and Mender going to the Eastern portion shall take the Tagaytay Nasugbu Road;

All private vehicles from Amadeo going to the Eastern part shall turn right to J.P. Rizal Avenue (Mahogany) then may turn left at Akle St. or make a U-turn at Hagdang Bato/intersection of J.P. Rizal Avenue and Tagaytay Nasugbu Road going to Tagaytay Nasugbu Road.

All PUAs from Amadeo bound to Manila shall turn right to J.P. Rizal Avenue (Mahogany) then shall take a U-turn at Hagdang Bato/intersection of J.P. Rizal Avenue and Tagaytay Nasugbu Road going to Tagaytay Nasugbu Road.

All private vehicles from the Western Part going to Amadeo shall take the Tagaytay Nasugbu Road and shall turn left at Crisanto Delos Reyes Avenue.

**SECTION 3.** The speed limit of 50km/hour shall be observed on one-way streets during holidays, weekends and special events to avoid accidents.

**SECTION 4.** The Tagaytay Office of Public Safety shall formulate the Implementing Rules and Regulations in the implementation of this ordinance, specifically for all PUJs and PUAs.

**SECTION 5.** Operator or Driver of a motor vehicle (public or private) who have violated any provision of this ordinance shall be penalized by confiscation of driver's license and a fine prescribed hereunder;

1st Offense	- Not exceeding Php1,000.00
2nd Offense	- Not exceeding Php2,500.00
3rd Offense	- Not exceeding Php5,000.00 or imprisonment not exceeding (3) months or both upon the discretion of the court.

**SECTION 6.** The Tagaytay City Component Police and the Tagaytay Office of Public Safety shall enforce this ordinance.

**SECTION 7.** This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon approval.

#### EXPLANATORY NOTE:

The planting aims to raise awareness to the society on the importance of planting and saving trees, express our concern to the environment, and diminish the unfavorable effects of climate change.

NOW THEREFORE, upon motion of Hon. Atenza Bryana D. Tolentino, seconded by Hon. Luis A. Paolo, be it ordained by the Sangguniang Panlungsod of Tagaytay that:

**SECTION 1.** This ordinance shall be known as "The Tree Planting Ordinance of Tagaytay City."

**SECTION 2. DECLARATION OF POLICY.** To protect and advance the right of the people to a balanced and healthful ecology; to recognize the importance of trees in ecological stability; to strengthen the cooperation between the Government and the public to prevent the loss of natural resources and restore our environment by requiring tree planting activities.

**SECTION 3. SCOPE.** This ordinance shall apply to the following:

- Residential owners, contractors/developers securing occupancy permit.
- Graduating students from elementary, secondary (Senior High Schools (public and private), and colleges/universities (public and private).
- Couples applying for Marriage License.
- Applicants for employment (securing Mayor's Permit).
- Retiring City employees and officials (elected & appointed) of the City Government
- Every household in the City of Tagaytay

**SECTION 4. DEFINITION OF TERMS.** For the purpose of this

ordinance, the following terms and phrases shall apply:

- Certificate of Occupancy** - refers to a document by a local government agency or building department certifying a building's compliance with the National Building Code and other laws, and indicating it to be in condition suitable for occupancy.
- Marriage** - either church or civil marriage.
- Trees** - shall refer to ornamental, fruit bearing or forest trees at least three (3) feet tall.

#### SECTION 5. GENERAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS.

- Planting Trees shall be one of the requirement for those securing the following:
  - Occupancy permit
  - Application for Marriage License
  - Graduation (elementary, secondary and tertiary)
  - Application for employment
  - Application for retirement/separation from service
- The City Agriculture Office shall point out areas where applicants could plant trees including specification or kind of trees.
- Applicants may provide their own trees or may purchase at the Office of the City Agriculture Office.
- The tree planting activities shall be done in any of the following areas:
  - Public school grounds, gardens or other available areas within the school premises;
  - Idle or vacant public lands;
  - Public parks in urban and rural areas; and
  - Private schools, parks and lands with the consent of the owner thereof;
  - In designated areas by concerned Punong Barangay.
- Applicants shall plant the following number of trees:
 

25	- for occupancy permit - residential
10	- for occupancy permit - commercial establishment
2	- for marrying couple
1	- for every graduating student
1	- for applicants for employment
1	- for retiring City employee/official of the City Government
1	- for every existing household (except those who have applied for occupancy permit)
- Upon compliance, a certification shall be issued by the City Agriculture Office to applicants, said certification shall form part of their requirements.

**SECTION 6. MONITORING & IMPLEMENTATION.** The City Agriculture Office in coordination with CENRO shall monitor the implementation of this ordinance. A weekly report shall be submitted to the Au-

for information and monitoring.

A copy of this ordinance shall be furnished to the Engineering Office, the City Planning & Development Office, the Academy, City Character Office, Human Resource & Management Office, the Association of Barangay Captains and developers.

**SECTION 7. PENALTY CLAUSE.** Non-compliance to this ordinance shall mean non-issuance of necessary permit or license to the applicant.

**SECTION 8. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE.** If for any reason, or reasons, any Section of this ordinance shall be held unconstitutional or invalid, other sections which are not affected, thereby shall continue to be in full force and effect.

**SECTION 9. REPEALING CLAUSE.** All other City ordinance which requires tree planting is hereby modified accordingly.

**SECTION 10. EFFECTIVITY.** This ordinance shall take effect upon approval.

### AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE POLICY FOR THE CITY GOVERNMENT OF TAGAYTAY

WHEREAS, His Excellency, President Rodrigo Duterte, in his drive against illegal drugs, issued Executive Order No. 66 series of 2016, initiating the Philippine Anti-Illegal Drugs Strategy (Pids).

WHEREAS, to ensure the successful implementation of the Pids, the Department of Interior and Local Government has issued Memorandum Circular No. 2018-213 dated 21 December 2018, Re: Dangerous Drugs Board Resolution No. 13 Series of 2018 Establishment and Institutionalization of Drug Free Workplaces Policies in all Government Offices, Including the Conduct of Authorized Drug Testing for Elective Local Official and Appointive Public Officers and for Other."

WHEREAS, the City Government has legal responsibility and management obligation to ensure a safe working environment among its employees and likewise to protect the public by ensuring that its employees have good physical and emotional stability in performing assigned duties.

NOW THEREFORE, upon motion of Hon. Joel B. Tibayan seconded by Hon. Claro C. Batino, BE IT ORDAINED by the Sangguniang Panlungsod of Tagaytay in session assembled that:

**SECTION 1.** It is hereby established A Drug-free Workplace Policy for the City Government of Tagaytay.

**SECTION 2. SCOPE.** This policy shall cover all employees of the City Government of Tagaytay notwithstanding their position as permanent, casual or service provider under a job order contract, elective and appointive public official.

#### SECTION 3. DEFINITION OF TERMS

a. **Authorized Drug Test** - the examination of a person's urine or blood serum in order to determine the presence of dangerous drugs. The testing shall be done in any government forensic laboratory or by any other drug testing laboratory accredited and monitored by DOH to safeguard the quality of the results. It shall employ among others, twin (2) testing methods, the screening test, which will determine the positive result as well as the type of the drug used, and the confirmatory test, which will confirm a positive screening test.

b. **Challenge Test** - a drug test conducted in an authorized drug testing activity as a result of a challenge filed by a public officer who tested positive for drug use in a confirmatory test.

c. **Confirmatory Test** - an analytical test using a device, tool or equipment with a different chemical or physical principle that is more specific which will validate and confirm a positive screening test.

d. **Contract of Service/Job Order** - refers to employment covered by a contract pertaining to temporary work or services such as contractual, consultative, or consultancy services where no employer-employee relationship exists; or of fixed or不定期的 job of short duration not exceeding six months or less, and even all of which are not covered by Civil Service Law, and if salaries, not covered by Commission on Audit rules; and the public officials or employees covered did not enjoy the benefits provided by government employees, including but not limited to personal economic and allowances, cost of living allowance, and representation and travel allowances.

e. **Dangerous Drugs** - including in those listed in the schedules annexed to the 1961 Single Convention on Narcotic Drugs, as amended by the 1972 Protocol, and in the Schedules annexed to the 1971 Single Convention.

on Psychotropic Substances as enumerated in the attached annex which is an integral part of Republic Act No. 9165 or the Comprehensive Dangerous Drugs Act of 2002 as amended (the "Act").

**f. Drug Dependency Examination** – refers to the examination conducted by DOH accredited physician who evaluates a person's extend of drug use and determines whether he/she is a drug dependent or not. Examination includes history taking, intake interview, determination of criteria for drug dependency, detection of dangerous drugs in urine or blood through laboratory procedures, mental and physical state.

**g. Chronic User/Drug Dependent** – a person who is compulsive drug user, with continuous use despite harmful consequences and long lasting changes in the brain.

**h. Employee Assistance Program** – a program for government officials or employees who offers assistance to those who have alcohol or drug related issues and problems that may affect work performance. This program shall be implemented by the officers assigned in the LGU.

**i. Experimenter** – a person whose drug use began through experimentation with limited exposure and no development of regular use or any related harm.

**j. Mandatory Drug Testing** – compulsory submission of a public officer or prospective employee to drug testing as mandated by the drug-free workplace policy of the LGU of Tagaytay City.

**k. Occasional User** – a person who indulges to drug use in order to create or enhance experience in any social setting.

**l. Public Officer** – any person holding any public office in the LGU of Tagaytay City by virtue of an appointment, election or contract.

**m. Random Drug Testing** – conduct of drug testing to all employees or any employee that resulted to equal probability from a group of employees without information as to when or where it will be done.

**n. Screening Test** – a rapid drug test performed to establish potential or presumptive positive result. It refers to the immunoassay test to eliminate a "negative" specimen i.e. one without the presence of dangerous drugs, from further consideration and to identify the presumptively positive specimen that requires confirmatory test.

**o. Agency** – refers to the Government Unit of Tagaytay City.

**p. Workplace** – a place where work is usually performed.

**SECTION 4. PRE-EMPLOYMENT DRUG TESTING.** Mandatory drug testing shall remain a requirement for employment. Any applicant found positive for drug use shall be denied to enter government service.

## SECTION 5. ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

### A. The City Administrator shall:

**i. Ensure the implementation of Drug-Free Workplace Policy in all departments of the agency and inform and provide copies to all Department Heads of the program.**

**ii. Maintain a drug-free workplace.**

**iii. Ensure adequate budget is allocated for the implementation of the Drug-Free Workplace Policy and Program**

**iv. Ensure that the Drug Free Workplace Committee and Assessment Team undergo regular training and are functional.**

**v. Ensures the creation of Employer Assistance Program that will provide resources for and/or referrals to medical interventions for public officers who have alcohol or drug-related problems that may affect work performance.**

### B. The Drug Free Workplace Committee shall:

**i. Conduct substance abuse awareness and prevention programs, medical and social risks associated with substance abuse.**

**ii. Assures the maintenance of Drug-Free Workplace**

**iii. Conduct mandatory and random drug testing**

**iv. Actively involved in the implementation of Employee Assistance Program.**

### C. Assessment Team shall:

**i. Assist in the conduct of substance abuse awareness and prevention programs,**

### D. The City Legal Officer shall:

**i. Enact any legal actions stated in the drug-free workplace policy.**

### E. The City Public Officer/Employee

**i. Abide by the terms of the drug-free workplace policy.**

**ii. Never use nor possess any drugs/substances classified as illegal by the DDB to his/her co-employees or other and/or to commit or aid in the commission of any unlawful acts Penalized under RA 9165.**

**iii. Voluntarily seek for assistance and support in any event that they have problems/concerns related to dangerous drugs.**

**iv. Help in the implementation and sustainability of Drug-Free Workplace in the agency.**

## SECTION 6. DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE PROGRAM

**i. The Agency has the full authority to conduct drug testing in all public offices to prevent the entry of dangerous drugs in the workplace and use of dangerous drugs among personnel. The frequency shall be conducted in random taking into consideration the funding number of personnel to be tested, nature of work and other logistics. All results shall be kept confidential for whom only the Local Chief Executive, Head of the Department and members of the Assessment Team shall have access.**

**ii. Drug testing shall be done and conducted by an authorized drug testing laboratory accredited by the Department of Health.**

**iii. It shall consist of screening and confirmatory tests; the latter to be done only if the result of the screening test turned out to be**

positive. The result of screening test will determine if a person is a drug user and as to the type of drug used while the confirmatory test confirms a positive screening test.

iv. A negative test result requires no further action and to the employer concerned while a positive drug test result from a confirmatory test shall immediately be relayed to the Local Chief Executive who shall notify the public officer concerned. After which, he/she has the right to challenge the result of the confirmatory test up to fifteen (15) days from receipt of positive result but it shall be done again in a DOH accredited drug testing laboratory. Expenses for the challenge shall be borne by the public officer concerned. However, all of the above shall be undertaken under conditions that will protect the employee's privacy and dignity.

v. In case the concerned employee with a positive result did not take the challenge on the prescribed time, the positive result of the confirmatory test shall be considered final. On the other hand, a positive drug test from the challenge test will be considered final and the agency shall take appropriate administrative action.

vi. All drug test results shall be attached to 291 File of all Public Officers and shall be held strictly confidential.

**SECTION 7. Mandatory Drug Testing** - is a compulsory submission a public officer or prospective employee to drug testing as mandated by drug-free workplace policy of the City of Tagaytay.

1.1 Mandatory drug testing (by urine test) for all public officers shall be done annually.

1.2 The HR Team shall notify the Head of the Department the mandatory drug testing for all of its employees on the day that it will be accomplished. In case an employee is absent on the said date, he/she shall be submitted to an unannounced schedule once he/she gets back to work.

1.3 Employees shall be instructed to proceed to the DOH accredited drug testing facility chosen by the agency where they will accomplish and sign the consent for and submit urine sample for examination.

1.4 After the conduct of drug test, employees are required to go back to their posts and resume their work.

1.5 All results shall be submitted to the head of the HR Department and not to the person who underwent the drug test. Head of HR will then inform the LCE of the results.

**SECTION 8. Random Drug Test** - conduct of drug testing to all personnel or any employee to be selected in equal probability from a group of employees without reference as to where or where it will be done.

6.1 Random drug testing shall be done without prior notice to randomly chosen employees or to those employees who are suspected to be using dangerous drugs.

6.2 A minimum of 10 percent (%) of the employees shall be sub-

jected to random drug testing but previously selected and newly hired employees shall be excluded from the sample if they were just subjected to drug test for the past 6 months.

6.3 Same procedure as mandatory drug testing follows.

**SECTION 9. EMPLOYEE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM** - A public officer can voluntarily seek assistance with the Employee Assistance Program prior to the conduct of authorized drug testing for proper intervention. It shall provide referrals and other needed services by the public officer concerned. The CHO or any Clinician who was trained on drug dependency examination can conduct such in order to determine the level of Substance Use Disorder and the proper intervention needed. However, such assistance shall not apply to public officers who were found to be positive for drug use only after the conduct of a confirmatory test.

**SECTION 10. DRUG DEPENDENCY EXAMINATION** - refers to the examination conducted by a DOH accredited physician who evaluates a person's extent of drug use and determines whether he/she is a drug dependent or not. This examination is done in aid of their treatment conducted for free by the CHO or any private physician trained on such examination. In such case, fee shall be shouldered by the employee.

Examination includes history taking, intake interview, determination of criteria for drug dependency, detection of dangerous drugs in urine or blood through laboratory procedures, mental and physical state.

#### c.1 EXPERIMENTER

c.1.1 While still in public service, public officer shall undergo a six (6) months counselling on his own expense.

c.1.2 Counselling should be done by a trained counsellor or psychiatrist.

c.1.3 If counselling is done during office hours, time spent shall be deducted against his/her leave credits.

c.1.4 After the six month period, a certificate of completion shall be secured and submitted to the head of the HR.

#### c.2 OCCASIONAL USER

c.2.1 While still in public service, public officer shall undergo counselling and monthly drug testing for 6 months without fail on his/her own expense.

c.2.2 Counselling should be done by a trained counsellor or psychiatrist and drug testing should be done in a DOH accredited facility.

c.2.3 If counselling is done during office hours, time spent shall be deducted against his/her leave credits.

c.2.4 After the six month period, a certificate of completion shall be secured and submitted to the head of the HR.

#### c.3 CHRONIC USER/DRUG DEPENDENT

- c.3. I shall undergo continuous rehabilitation and treatment for a minimum period of six months in a government rehabilitation facility, DOH accredited rehabilitation facility, or through a community rehabilitation program authorized by DBB.

However, if the employee is found positive on drug testing with this evaluation result, a penalty of dismissal from service shall be imposed even from a first offense according to Rule 10 of the 2017 Rules of Administrative Cases in the Civil Service.

**D. MONITORING** - Implementation of the policy and programs of the Drug-Free Workplace of the LGU of Tagaytay City shall be executed by the Committee on Drug-Free Workplace and Assessment Team.

- Reports that include the following shall be regularly submitted to the Dangerous Drugs Board and DILG:
  - a. number of officials and employees subject to drug testing
  - b. those found positive for drug use; and
  - c. action undertaken by the Committee on those found positive for drug use.

**SECTION 11.** The Local Chief Executive shall issue an Executive Order on the Composition and Functions of the Drug-Free Workplace Committee and Assessment Team.

#### SECTION 12. SANCTIONS

I. Administrative offense of Grave Misconduct or Gross Insubordination of Public Officials and Employees shall be provided corresponding penalties due to the following reasons (based from Revised Rules on Administrative Cases in the Civil Service, December, 2011; Sec. 60 of the Local Government Code and Article 124 (3) of the Implementing Rules and Regulations of the Local Government Code):

**A. Grave misconduct** – punishable by dismissal from government service.

1. Officials and employees found to have used dangerous drugs during the prescribed period of their intervention or rehabilitation.
2. Public officials and employees who are not issued a certificate of completion (in the case of experimenter and occasional user) or a certificate of completion with clearance (in case of chronic user/drug dependent)
3. Public Official or employee who, after being tested positive of drug use, shall refuse to undergo treatment or rehabilitation, or fails to complete his/her treatment or rehabilitation program.
4. Appointive or elective public officer who was found positive for drug use after the conduct of a confirmatory test in an authorized drug Testing activity.
5. Any public officer found to have tampered the result of a drug test,

interfered with the conduct of the drug test or in the release of drug test results, or violated rules of confidentiality of records.

**B. Gross Insubordination** – is punishable by suspension of six months and one (1) day to one year for the first offense and dismissal from service for the second offense. This administrative punishment shall be applied to anyone who refuses without any valid reason, to submit himself/herself for drug testing.

#### II. Procedure

The Legal Office of the Agency shall be considered in the imposition of penalties to any public officer found to have committed administrative liabilities.

**SECTION 13. FUNDING.** The City Government, thru the City Health Office shall ensure annual funding for the implementation of this ordinance.

The barangay drug testing for the barangay officials, employees and job order personnel shall be shouldered solely by the Barangay and must also be part of their budgetary appropriation.

**SECTION 14. DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE POLICIES IN BARANGAYS** – Every Barangay within the City of Tagaytay shall establish their respective Workplace Policies.

#### SECTION 15. CONFIDENTIALITY

All results of the drug test shall remain confidential and secured at the office of the HR Head. Any person who intentionally or unintentionally violated the confidentiality of the results shall be prosecuted for violation of Section 32, Article II of the Act.

#### SECTION 16. REPEALING CLAUSE

All ordinances, resolutions or laws of local application and effect inconsistent hereto are hereby modified, superseded, and repealed accordingly.

#### SECTION 17. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE

If, for any reasons, any part of provision thereof shall be held unconstitutional or invalid, other parts or provisions hereof which are not affected hereby shall continue to be in full force and effect.

#### SECTION 18. SUPPLEMENTARY CLAUSE

On matters not provided in this ordinance any existing applicable laws and their corresponding implementing rules and regulations, executive orders and relevant issuances issued therefore shall be applied in a supplemental manner.

#### SECTION 19. EFFECTIVITY

This Ordinance shall take effect upon approval and compliance to the mandatory posting and publication requirement prescribed under R.A. 7160 otherwise known as Local Government Code of 1991.

**AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE SELLING AND USING/RELEASING OF ALL KINDS OF FLYING GAS BALLOONS AND SKY LANTERN IN ALL OUTDOOR CELEBRATION WITHIN THE CITY OF TAGAYTAY**

SPONSOR: HON. LOIS ANGELA R. PALO

Committee on Environmental Protection & Sanitation

WHEREAS, According to the Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000, RA 9003, Chapter 6 Penal Provisions Section 48. Prohibited Acts - The following acts are prohibited: (1) Littering, throwing, dumping of waste matters in public places, such as: roads, sidewalks, canals, streams or parks, and establishments, or causing or permitting the same.

WHEREAS, releasing of flying gas balloons and sky lanterns outdoor uses littering; furthermore, balloons are biodegradable wastes which take years to break down; may release chemicals to the environment, while latex balloons primarily affect animals and mylar/foil balloons can cause dangerous power outages and spark fires.

WHEREAS, there is a need to pass a policy banning the selling and using/releasing of all flying gas balloons and sky lanterns at any single outdoor celebration, promotional activity, sporting events or even during burial ceremonies and other public event within the territorial jurisdiction and air-space of the City of Tagaytay;

NOW THEREFORE, upon motion of Hon. Lois Andrea R. Palo, seconded by Hon. Athena Bryana D. Tolentino, BE IT ORDAINED by the Sangguniang Panlungsod of Tagaytay City that:

**SECTION 1.** Title - This ordinance shall be known as "An Ordinance Prohibiting the Selling and Use of Outdoor Release of all Flying Gas Balloons and Sky Lanterns in all Occasions within the City Of Tagaytay."

**SECTION 2.** Scope - This ordinance shall cover all barangays, public and private establishments, outdoor celebration, promotional activity, sporting events or even during burial ceremonies and other public events in the City of Tagaytay.

**SECTION 3.** - Declaration of Policy: The City Government shall protect and advance the right of the people to a balanced and healthful ecology and to ensure a more conducive environment.

**SECTION 4.** Prohibited Act. The selling, using or releasing of any flying gas balloons and sky lantern at any single outdoor celebration, promotional activity, sporting events or even during burial ceremonies and other public events is hereby prohibited.

**SECTION 5.** Monitoring and Implementation Ordinance - the City Environment and Natural Resources Office (CENRO) and Business Permit and Licensing Office (BPMO) shall monitor the effective implementation of this Ordinance.

**SECTION 6.** Penalties - The following fines and penalties shall be imposed in violation of this ordinance.

A. For any person (natural or juridical)

1st offense	- Php300.00
2nd offense	- Php500.00 plus 1 day community service
3rd offense	- Php1,000.00 plus 2 days community service

B. For establishments, the owner or manager

1st offense	- Php1,000.00
2nd offense	- Php3,000.00
3rd offense	- Php5,000.00 plus closure of business

**SECTION 7.** Effectively - This Ordinance shall take effect upon approval.

#### **AN ORDINANCE PREVENTING AND CONTROLLING OUTBREAK OF DENGUE CASES IN THE CITY OF TAGAYTAY**

**SPEECHER: HON. ATHENA BRYANA D. TIBANTING**

Committee on Health

**WHEREAS**, Section 16 of the Local Government Code states that every Local Government Unit shall exercise the powers expressly granted them necessarily implied therefrom, as well as the powers necessary, appropriate or incident to its efficient and effective governance, and those with essential to the promotion of the general welfare. Within their territorial jurisdiction, local government units shall ensure and support, among other things, the preservation and enrichment of culture, promote health and safety, enhance the right of the people to the balance ecology;

**WHEREAS**, the City of Tagaytay and its respective barangays are mandated by the Local Government Code to promote health and safety of its constituents by providing measures to prevent and control the spread of diseases that include Dengue;

**WHEREAS**, Dengue is the fastest spreading vector borne disease in the world endemic to one hundred (100) countries including the Philippines;

**WHEREAS**, Dengue can be prevented and controlled, it is important that the community is provided with a community based Dengue Prevention and Control Mechanism and improve the existing policies implemented by the LGU;

**NOW, THEREFORE**, upon motion of Hon. Athena Bryana D. Tibanting, seconded by Hon. Dr. Roldano P. Pasion, Sangguniang Panlungsod of Tagaytay that:

**SECTION 1.** This ordinance shall be known as "The Dengue Prevention and Control Ordinance of the City of Tagaytay."

**SECTION 2. Scope.** This ordinance shall be applied to all residential houses (within the barangay and subdivisions), schools (public and private), business establishments and other public/government facilities within the jurisdiction of Tagaytay.

#### SECTION 3. ESTABLISHMENT OF BARANGAY DENGUE BRI-

**GATE.** All Barangays shall create a Barangay Dengue Brigade to conduct activities to prevent and control Dengue in their respective barangays which shall be composed but not limited to:

##### A. Composition

Chairperson	Punong Barangay
Members	Midwife/Nurse
	Barangay Councilors
	BHW
	Parents Leaders
	Barangay Teachers
	Day Care Teacher
	NGOs

##### B. Duties and Responsibilities:

- Conduct 4 o'clock habit and 4:5 Kontro Dengue and Aksyon. Barangay Kontro Dengue in their respective barangays including schools, private establishments and subdivisions.
- Inspect schools (public and private), residential homes (including subdivisions) and even establishments for larval survey.
- Engage the participation of all households and the public and private sectors in massive information dissemination and larval survey, search and destroy operations.
- Conduct clean up drive in the barangay once a week.
- Conduct information dissemination for the prevention and control of Dengue and reproduce IEC materials on Dengue to be distributed to the populace of the barangay.
- Immediately reporting of Dengue cases to the CEBU Section of the City Health Office.
- Perform other functions on the prevention and control of Dengue that may deem necessary.

**SECTION 4.** The City Health Office shall perform and monitor the following:

- Conduct monitoring and evaluation of the activities of Barangay Dengue Brigade
- Conduct surveillance of cases
- Conduct flogging and misting activities when necessary
- Provide technical assistance, logistics and support to all barangays
- Provide immediate management for suspected Dengue cases
- Analyze larval survey report and develop strategies on Dengue Control and Prevention.

**SECTION 5. Funding.** Funds necessary for the Dengue Control and Prevention Program shall be funded under the City Health Office.

**WHEREAS**, This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon approval.

#### AN ORDINANCE MANDATING THE REMOVAL OF ALL OBSTRUCTIONS ON PUBLIC ROADS AND HIGHWAYS IN THE CITY OF TAGAYTAY

WHEREAS, Pursuant to the Notice and Order, a certificate (DAGI) Regist. IV-A, Memorandum Circular No. 2017-001 dated May 22, 2018, mandates the removal of all obstructions on public roads and highways in LGUs pursuant to Executive Order No. 106, amending the required road easement;

WHEREAS, Presidential directive during the 4th State of the Nation Address of the President is to clear roads of illegal structures and constructions whereas all local officials are expected to exercise their powers essential to reclaim public roads which are being used for private ends and in the process rid them of all illegal structures and constructions;

WHEREAS, all Local Chief Executive are directed ordered to remove all obstructions on public roads and highways such as electrical poles,

support wires and other uses and facilities owned by utility companies such as NEPCO, PLDT, and other telecommunications companies;

NOW THEREFORE, upon motion of Hon. Blanca Candille U. Pelo seconded by Hon. Maricela A. Austria, be enacted by the Sanggunian Panlungsod of Tagaytay that:

#### SECTION 1. TITLE.

This shall be known as AN ORDINANCE MANDATING THE REMOVAL OF ALL OBSTRUCTIONS ON PUBLIC ROADS AND HIGHWAYS IN THE CITY OF TAGAYTAY

SECTION 2. SCOPE. This ordinance shall cover all public roads accessible routes roads and highways in the City of Tagaytay.

#### SECTION 3. DECLARATION OF POLICY

- All obstructions shall be removed on all National Highways, City and Barangay Roads.
- Sidewalks and walkways shall be cleared of all illegal structures and parked vehicles.
- "No Parking Zone" for all kinds of motor vehicles including motorcycle/motorcycles on all National Highways, City and Barangay Roads.

#### SECTION 4. DEFINITION OF TERMS

**Builder's materials** – refers to any material which is used for construction purposes such as clay, rocks, sand, and wood.

**Double parked** – refers to a vehicle parked beside a row of vehicles, all parked parallel to the curb.

**Obstruction** – refers to something that obscures, blocks or covers with an obstacle or obstruction.

**Public roads** – refers to any road or street open to public travel under the jurisdiction of and maintained by the City Government of Tagaytay.

**Scapholding** – refers to a temporary structure outside of a building, made usually of wooden planks and metal poles, used by workers while building, repairing or cleaning a building.

**Signboards** – refers to a sign with its message on it or showing the name of a business, school, hospital.

**Utility poles/poles** – refers to a pole used to carry telephone wires and other utility lines above the ground.

**Vendor** - refers to a person or company offering something for sale or maybe traders in the street.

#### SECTION 5. GENERAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

1. The City Engineering Office is hereby directed to remove all out buildings, builders materials, signboards, advertisements and structures constructed along easements;
  2. The BPLO shall make inspection of businesses applying for permit for tiendas and sari-sari stores; and shall not issue permit if the business will cause obstruction on barangay/city roads and the national highway;
  3. The Tagaytay Office of Public Safety and the Tagaytay City Component Police and Barangay Officials shall post NO PARKING ZONE signages; shall strictly implement the loading and unloading zone; and shall tow all illegally parked and/or double parked vehicles;
  4. The Tagaytay Office of Public Safety, the Tagaytay City Component Police, Barangay Officials and Barangay Tanods shall:
- Not allow hawking or peddling and vendors to ply around the national roads/highways;
  - Advise removal of all obstructions on all city and barangay roads;
  - Apprehend all violators of this ordinance;

5. The City Administrator's Office shall request MERALCO, PLDT and other communication companies to relocate all posts/poles along the roads as per DILG Memorandum Circular No. 2019-121 and DILG R-4A Memorandum 2017-19(Removal of all obstructions on public roads and highways in LGUs territorial jurisdiction and for the strict enforcement of the required road easement)

**SECTION 6. SANCTIONS**: Penalties - The following fines and penalties shall be imposed in violation of this ordinance.

##### C. For any person (natural or juridical)

- 1st offense - not to exceed Php1,000.00  
 2nd offense - not to exceed Php2,000.00 plus 1 day community service  
 3rd offense - not to exceed Php3,000.00 plus 2 days community service

##### D. For establishments, the owner or manager

4.11. The area outside of IN-Movie Theatre shall ensure that there shall be no littering, especially in the movie area, i.e., 25

continuously posted with the premises. It shall also endeavor to extend the privilege to Senior Citizens and PWDs who are not aware of the on-going program for them as well as through the help of COMINFO for dissemination of information.

**SECTION 5. AUTHORITY TO ENTER INTO AND SIGN CONTRACT.** The Local Chief Executive is hereby authorized to enter into and sign a Contract for the Free Movie Access for Senior Citizens and PWDs. Further authorized to enter into renewal of contract upon mutual agreement with the owner of the Cinema.

AN ORDINANCE IMPLEMENTING AFRICAN SWINE FEVER

## PREVENTION AND CONTROL WITHIN THE CITY OF TAGAYTAY

**AUTHOR & SPONSOR: HON. LORNA S. TOLEDO**

WHEREAS, African Swine Fever (ASF) is a part of disaster that possibly happens and strike anywhere if the infection will not be contained and controlled to one place, the need to mobilize the Disaster Management Team of the City Government to assist the City Agriculture Office in the implementation of ASF Control and Prevention Measure.

NOW THEREFORE, upon motion of Hon. Lorna S. Toledo, seconded by Hon. Reynoso M. Espina, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE SANGGUNIANG PANLUNGSOD THAT

**SECTION 1: TITLE.** This Ordinance shall be known as "An Ordinance Adopting and Implementing the African Swine Fever (ASF) Prevention and Control in the City of Tagaytay".

**SECTION 2: PURPOSE.** This Ordinance is enacted for the purpose of preventing and controlling possible entry/outbreak of ASF in the country.

### SECTION 3: OBJECTIVES AND PURPOSE

1. To prevent the entry of ASF thus ensuring public safety;
2. To protect the local hog industry; and
3. To promote and protect the health, safety, and general welfare of the residents.

**SECTION 4: SCOPE & COVERAGE.** This Ordinance shall be enforced within the territorial jurisdiction of Tagaytay City.

**SECTION 5: DEFINITIONS.** For the purpose of this Ordinance, the following terms and phrases shall apply:

African Swine Fever refers to so called warthog fever, highly contagious and usually fatal viral disease of swine that is characterized by high fever, lesions, leukopenia (abnormally low count of white blood cells), elevated pulse and respiration rate, and death within four to seven days after the onset of fever.

Indemnification Fund - a fund required to pay the value of hogs per head in case of epidemic outbreak. All pigs within one (1) kilometer radius will be culled simultaneously to prevent further spread of infection.

Hogs - a domesticated pig, especially one over 100 pounds (34 kg) and used for slaughter.

**SECTION 6: CREATION OF THE LOCAL AFRICAN SWINE FEVER TASK FORCE.** The ASF Prevention Control Task Force shall be

formed and shall be the main authority to oversee the implementation of the provisions of this Ordinance and other related activities as may be provided by rules and regulations and guidelines promulgated by higher authority or mandated by the national laws. It shall be composed, but not limited to the following:

Chairman	City Mayor
Vice Chairman,	City Vice Mayor
Members	Chairman, Committee on Agriculture City Health Officer City Agriculture PNP Commander ABC President One (1) NGO Representative City Action Officer/Information Officer City Disaster Coordinating Officer President, Market Vendors Association

**SECTION 7. CENSUS.** The Local Government of Tagaytay thru the office of the City Veterinary/City Agriculture Office shall conduct a census of all hogs and piggeries within the City.

**SECTION 8. PROHIBITION OF POSSESSION, OFFER FOR SALE AND/OR SALE.** It shall be prohibited for any person to possess, offer for sale, engage in trade or have in possession any infected swine.

**SECTION 9. ROLE OF BALANGAY OFFICIALS (Barangay Council on Agriculture)**

1. Assist the Agricultural Technician in disseminating information to all hog raisers in respective barangays on the proper swine management practice required to avoid the occurrence of infection.
2. Report to the City Agriculture Office the incidence of any abnormal being noticed to swine within their area of jurisdiction.

#### SECTION 10. ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

1. The City Agriculture Office shall regularly submit a monthly report to the Local Chief Executive on existing backyard piggeries and the Provincial Veterinary Surveillance must be conducted monthly in licensed commercial breeding or small acceptable hogs.
2. The local PNP shall enforce movement control of hogs, farm equipment and tools from the source of infected hogs.
3. In the event of a PNP curfew, the City Government shall conduct a culling operation.

**SECTION 11. PREVISION OF INGENIERIATION FUND.** In the event of the curfew has been declared or 25% of the population has been affected the expenses for massive culling of hogs in the barangays distribution materials, vehicles and disinfector to be used for cleaning and disinfection of

the pig pens/pens after the elimination of infected animals and the value of living animals to be culled shall be taken from the Quick Response Fund (City Disaster Risk Reduction Fund).

The amount of Five Thousand (P5,000.00) per head of swine shall be paid to hog raisers to compensate for animals that are killed during the culling operations.

**SECTION 12. PENALTY.** Any violation of this Ordinance by any person, farm meat seller and backyard farm owners shall be liable to prosecution and upon conviction, shall be subject to cancellation of business permit, a fine of not less than One Thousand Pesos (P1,000.00) but not more than Ten Thousand Pesos (P10,000.00), or imprisonment of not less than two (2) months but not more than one (1) year or both, upon discretion of the Court. In case of a corporation/commercial hog raisers if found liable, the officers will be held liable.

**SECTION 13. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE.** If any section or provision of this ordinance is declared invalid, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected by such declaration.

**SECTION 14. EFFECTIVITY.** This ordinance shall take effect upon immediate upon approval.

**WHEREAS**, exhaust system of motor vehicles with modified mufflers and loud automobile horns has been the subject of numerous complaints because it causes undesirable/irritating sounds that leads to distraction and even accidents. Further, loud muffler noise agitate drivers as it affects hearing, vision, reaction time and judgment thereby increasing the risk of danger for everyone on the road, likewise, causes disturbance to people during nighttime in residential areas;

**WHEREAS**, one of the cause of noise pollution attributed to a large number of two-wheeled and three wheeled vehicles and other vehicles with modified pipes and mufflers thundering through streets and neighborhoods causing disturbance to people;

**NOW THEREFORE**, upon motion of Hon. Athena Bryana D. Tolentino, seconded by Hon. Marcelo A. Austria, be it ordained by the Sangguniang Panlungsod that :

**SECTION 1. TITLE.** This ordinance shall be known as "An Ordinance Prohibiting the Use of Noisy Mufflers and Regulating the Blowing of Horns by All Vehicles, Whether Public or Private Within the City of Tagaytay and Penalizing Owners or Driver that Contribute to Noise Pollution within the City of Tagaytay.

**SECTION 2. DEFINITION OF TERMS**

**Exhaust System** – refers to piping used to guide reaction exhaust gases from a controlled combustion inside an engine

**Horns** – refers to a sound-making device that can be equipped to motor vehicles. The sound made usually resembles a "honk" (older vehicles) or a "beep" (modern vehicles).

**Motor Vehicles** – refers to two-wheeled or three-wheeled vehicles (motorcycles and tricycles), automobiles and trucks.

**Muffler** – refers to a device for reducing the noise emitted by the exhaust of an internal combustion engine.

**Noise Pollution** – harmful or annoying levels of noise

**SECTION 3. PROHIBITED ACT.** The following are hereby strictly prohibited within the City of Tagaytay

- 3.1 All motor vehicles with modified pipes and mufflers causing loud noise.
- 3.2 Blowing of horns while passing schools, hospitals, churches and places of worships.

**SECTION 4. EXEMPTIONS.** Ambulance, Barangay Patrols, PNP Mobile cars responding to emergency cases are hereby exempted from the provisions of this ordinance.

**SECTION 5. GENERAL ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION.**

5.1 The City Government through the General Services Office and the City Engineering Office will provide the necessary signages for the strict implementation of the ordinance.

5.2 The Tagaytay Office of Public Safety and the Tagaytay City Component Police shall implement this ordinance.

**SECTION 6. PENALTY CLAUSE.** Any person found violating this ordinance shall be penalized as follows :

1st Offense	- Fine not exceeding P1,000.00
2nd Offense	- Fine not exceeding P3,000.00
3rd Offense	- Impounding of Vehicle

**SECTION 7. REPEALING CLAUSE.** All prior ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed or modified accordingly.

**SECTION 8. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE** – If any section or provision of this ordinance is declared invalid, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected by such declaration.

**SECTION 9. EFFECTIVITY CLAUSE.** This ordinance shall take effect fifteen days upon publication or posting in conspicuous places.

## Firms, consumers how less optimism

Businesses are less optimistic about the first quarter of 2020 compared to the current quarter—part of the annual sentiment cycle—their outlook is expected to improve for rest of the year, according to the latest survey of the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas (BSP).

At the same time, central bank's quarterly poll showed that 10 consumers expect a more resilient life with the bulk of duals expecting to

maintain their current level of optimism going into the new year.

Meanwhile, consumer outlook for the next 12 months was less optimistic as the confidence index decreased to 26.4 percent from the third quarter of 2019's survey result of 29.8 percent.

The lower confidence for the first quarter of 2020 and the next 12 months stemmed from households' anticipation of higher prices of commodities, not or

## PH economic growth to remain strong in coming decade, says think tank

The Philippine economy will remain strong among the strongest across the globe in the coming decade partly due to its demographic sweet spot and educated workforce, according to the Economist Intelligence Unit (EIU).

In a Dec. 19 report, Simon Baptist, EIU global chief economist and managing director for Asia, said in the next decade "the world will have to get used to a slowing China."

"I expect that growth will be roughly half as fast in the 2020s as it was in the 2010s," Baptist said in his report titled "The Next Decade."

Baptist predicted that in the 2020s the fastest growing economies would be in Africa, except for Nigeria, and South and Southeast Asia "with Bangladesh, Kenya and the Philippines all looking at a strong decade."

Baptist said on a social media post that the following augured well for the Philippines' sustained strong economic growth: urbanization, reducing natural-disaster exposure, political stability, English skills, trade openness and population growth.

In the report, Bapti-

tions will be a global concern. "In the mid-2020s this will mean fast economic growth for the economies whose populations are aging and declining the fastest, like Japan, Italy and Portugal," the report said.

"But it will increasingly cause difficulties such as strengthening currencies and labor markets like China, Russia and Thailand," Baptist said.

In contrast, the Philippines has a relatively young population. "The other week, Finance Secretary Carlos G. Dominguez III pointed out that 'the Philippines is poised to catch up what has been called the 'demographic dividend'."


