"Upon perusal of their submission, their joint venture proposal was deemed complete, subject to detailed evaluation by the PPP (Public Private Partnership) selection committee," Jesse Grepo, legal officer and secretary of the committee, said in a text message as the bid was opened last Dec. 17.

Five other potential bidders, including Danilo Atienza Air Base, the formal name of the existing Sangley Metro Pacific Investments Corp. and Manuel Villar Jr.'s Prime Asset Ventures, did not submit proposals.

With no challengers, the CCCC-MacroAsia consortium is poised to win the project, which was structured as a venture with the local government unit, meaning it will not need the approval of agencies such as the National Economic and Development Authority to proceed.

Grepo said the review will likely last through next year with a potential awarding date on Jan. 15, 2020. A ceremonial of Naia's existing ap-

The other companies were Metro Pacific, Prime Asset Ventures, and Philippine Airport Ground Support Solutions Inc., led by businessman Jefferson Cheng. The two other entities were Langham Properties Inc. and Mossveldt Law

Offices. Some of the bidders sought more but requests were turned down by Cavite government which extended the first deadline on Dec. 17 this year.

Earlier, the Cavite government said, the first phase of the project could be open as early as 2022 with a capacity of 25 million passengers annually. The current Sangley Airport is being readied by the Department of Transportation (DOT) to handle general aviation and turboprop operations. The airport now has a 2,400-meter runway, a terminal for 160 passengers and an apron that can accommodate up to five turboprop planes.

The DOT expects to be reimbursed for costs it incurred should the Cavite government's plan push through, Transportation secretary Arthur Tugade earlier said. The Sangley Point International Airport, as part of the DOT's so-called multi-gateway strategy to address congestion in Manila and nearby provinces.

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Section 2. Title. This ordinance shall be called "The Mindanusa Children's Code of 2019."

Section 3. Definition of Terms:

a. "Children" refers to persons below eighteen (18) years of age or those even but are unable to take care of themselves from abuse, neglect, cruelty, exploitation or discrimination because of physical or mental disability or condition.

b. "Child abuse" refers to the maltreatment, whether physical or not of the child which includes the following:

1. Psychological and physical abuse, neglect, cruelty, sexual abuse and emotional maltreatment;
2. Any act by deeds or words which debases, degrades or demeans the intrinsic worth and dignity of a child as a human being;
3. Unreasonable deprivation of his basic needs for survival, such as food and shelter; or
4. Failure to give immediate medical attention to an injured child resulting in serious impairment of his growth and development or to his permanent incapacity or death.

c. "Circumstances" which greatly threaten or endanger the survival and normal development of children include but are not limited to the following:

1. Living in a community where there is armed conflict or being affected by armed conflict activity;
2. Working under conditions hazardous to life, safety and normal development which unduly interferes with their normal development;
3. Living in or staying for long periods in the streets or other public places without the care of parents or a guardian or basic services needed for a good quality of life;
4. Being a member of a poor family living in a depressed community and/or living under conditions of extreme poverty or in an area which is under developed and/or has inadequate access to basic services needed for a quality good life;
5. Circumstances analogous to those above stated which endanger the life, safety or normal development of children.

d. Comprehensive program against child abuse, exploitation and discrimination refers to the coordinated program of services and facilities to protect children against.

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3. In the full implementation of this ordinance and the overall development of all children within the locality, local programs, projects and activities shall be coordinated with, as far as practicable, national government agencies concerned.

Section 4. Role and Duty of the Local Chief Executive

a. The local Chief Executive, for and on behalf of the local government, shall be responsible for the implementation of this Ordinance and the attainment of its overall objectives, provided, that in addition to the duties delegated to and imposed by the local chief executive, he/she is hereby authorized and directed to cause the full implementation of this ordinance as well as to exercise those powers necessary, appropriate, incidental or essential for the promotion of the survival, development, protection and participation of children in politics, and the general welfare.

b. In regulation of establishments, enterprises, projects and activities which are subject to the authority of the local government, the office of the local chief executive shall take into account the following: personal, economic or financial interests of parents and families including personal, financial or material interests of children. The local chief executive shall be authorized, after due notice, hearing, investigation, in order and subject to the clause of not unduly interfering with the operations.

c. The local chief executive is hereby authorized with necessary local government resources to ensure the safety and well-being of the children in each local government.

Section 5. Role of the Sanggunian Legislative Committee: (a) The Committee on Women and Family Affairs of the Sangguniang Bayan of Mindanusa-Cebu, composed of its chairperson, the president of the Federation of Sangguniang Kabataan and sanggunian members thereof, shall have the following functions and responsibilities:

1. Formulate, consider and deliberate on proposals, resolutions and bills affecting children, their survival, protection, development and participation;
2. Conduct periodic public hearings and consultations with appropriate organizations and agencies involved with children; and
3. Receive, process reports and recommendations and dialogue with the Council of Children.

Section 6. Creation of the Municipal Council for Children: - (a) There shall be established a Council for Children which shall be composed of the Mayor as chairperson and representatives of an accredited non-

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1. Child protection and sexual abuse;
2. Child trafficking;
3. Obscene publications and indecent shows;
4. Other acts of abuse; and
5. Circumstances which threaten or endanger the survival and normal development of children.

Section 8. Rights of the Child: - (a) All children shall be entitled to the rights herein set forth without distinction as to the legitimacy of legitimacy, sex, social status, religion, political attachments, and other factors.

(b) All children shall possess the following rights as classified into survival, development, protection and participation rights:

- Survival Rights - include the inherent right to life, the right to a name and nationality, the right to identity and those relating with parental and governmental duties and obligations, adequate and decent standard of living, access to basic health care and services, social security, rehabilitation;
- Development Rights - refer to access to educational opportunities and relevant information, play, leisure, cultural activities, and rights to freedom of thought, conscience and religion;
- Protection Rights - cover those rights which guard against the protection of children from all forms of abuse, exploitation and discrimination, right to privacy;
- Participation Rights - pertain to the rights of freedom of expression and to have one's views taken into account, involvement in decision-making and consultative processes, freedom of association and assembly.

Article 2

LOCAL GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS AND CITIZEN'S AND PARTICIPATION RIGHTS OF CHILDREN

Section 7. Mandatory Consultation of National Projects and Coordination with agencies

a. Prior to implementation of any national project by any and all national government agencies, bureaus, offices with regard to children, the express approval by the Mayor and the sanggunian shall be obtained after holding on the public hearing on the same.

The Municipal Health Officer, the Municipal Planning and Development Officer, the Public Information Officer and the Chief of Police shall provide the necessary technical assistance to the council.

(b) The Municipal Council for Children shall:

1. Serve as the Oversight Committee in the monitoring and implementation of this code, and to such other related proposals and official recommendations for legislative action to protect, enhance children;
2. Act as advisory committee to the sanggunian with respect to children's protection and development and the use of local appropriation for the purpose;
3. Advise the municipal treasury with the assistance of the sanggunian to allocate fund from the Special Children's Fund to be used in accordance with the budget provided;
4. Designate the agency where the executive action on children as provided in Section 10 hereof shall be performed and any other municipal law or ordinance will conform thereto in Section 17 hereof;
5. Design and undertake education programs for the general public, specific sectors and interest groups, special types of children such as but not limited to working children, abandoned children, indigenous people's children, youth offenders;
6. Prepare and present an annual assessment of the implementation of this ordinance to the majority of children as provided in Section 14 hereof; and
7. Such other functions, as the sanggunian may designate.

(c) The council shall within six (6) months from the effectivity of this ordinance shall formulate a comprehensive program for the full and integrated implementation of the ordinance. This program shall be incorporated in the municipal development plan.

(d) Meetings and Quorum. The Council shall meet at least once a month or as may be necessary to approve resolutions and proposals.

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Labour and Employment and the Office of the Mayor provided. That the following requirements in all instances are strictly complied with.

(c) The employer shall ensure the protection, health, safety, morals and normal development of the child.

(d) The employer shall ensure measures to protect the child's participation in the community taking into account the interests and level of involvement, the duration and the appropriateness of working time, and

(e) The employer shall formulate and implement, subject to the approval and supervision of competent authorities, a continuing program for training and skills acquisition of the employees.

In the above exceptional cases where any such child may be employed, the employer shall file copies, before engaging such child, with papers from the Department of Labour and Employment and the Office of the Mayor which shall ensure observance of the child.

(f) No person shall employ child workers in all circumstances of advertisement, promoting alcoholic beverages, intoxicating drinks, tobacco and its by-products and violence.

Article 4

SURVIVAL AND DEVELOPMENT RIGHTS OF CHILDREN

Section 17. **Primary Health Care** - The local government shall implement a primary health care program which shall be formulated by the Municipal Health Office in consultation with its members of the Department of Health.

Section 18. **The Day Care Center** - (a) The total developmental and protection of children program for day care centers shall be provided for children up to six (6) years of age with the consent of parents, provided, however, that in cases of abuse, neglect or reported children, such consent shall not be required.

(b) The program shall include the following:

(1) Monitoring of ingestion of toxins and the recognition of the symptoms such as: symptoms of tuberculosis, diarrhea, tetanus, measles, polio, etc.; and such other diseases for which measures have been developed for administration to children up to six (6) years of age.

(2) Growth and nutritional monitoring, with appropriate nutritional feeding and supervision of nutritional intake at home.

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(3) Care for children of working mothers during the day, and where feasible, care for children up to six (6) years of age when mothers are working at night. Provided, that the Day Care Center must not take care of children in a particular place but shall develop a network of homes where mothers may take care of the children up to six (6) years of age of working mothers during work hours, with adequate supervision from the supervising social welfare officer of the Department of Social Welfare and Development.

(4) Materials and network of surrogate mother-teacher who will provide emotional and mental stimulation to children, as well as supervised appropriate stimulation, with a balanced program of supervised play, manual stimulation activities, and group activities with peers.

(5) A system for school, registered or employed children either in one child institution in the barangay and/or group of children in a home which will take children in legal need of protection due to a situation which endangers the child in which has exposed the child to poverty and abuse.

(6) A system and support system for pregnant mothers for prenatal and postnatal care and, in the proper case, for delivery of the infant under conditions which will ensure an appropriate and safe delivery and child provided that high-risk mothers shall be referred to the proper medical or secondary care services personnel and children who are at risk, from conditions or those who will be brought for care, provided, however, that the day care center shall be kept in proper condition and equipped with "alone" so that they are provided the necessary basic training for normal delivery and are exposed to appropriate high-risk pregnancies which should be referred to appropriate obstetrical and pediatric medical care for mother and child who are at risk, and

(7) A support system and network of assistance from among the members of the barangay for the total development and protection of children.

The municipality shall establish day-care centers in areas determined by the Council for Children in coordination with barangays where such centers may be set-up. These centers may be co-managed and jointly operated by the municipality and barangays concerned.

Article 5

PENAL PROVISIONS

Section 19. **General Penalty** - Violations of any provision of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding Two Thousand Five Hundred.

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(P 2,500.00) Fine is an imprisonment for a period not exceeding two (2) months, or both at the discretion of the court.

Section 20. **Public Hearing** - This ordinance shall be submitted to a public hearing within sixty (60) days to which citizens and representatives from the public.

Section 21. **Information Dissemination** - The Office of the Municipal Social Welfare and Development and the Office of the Mayor is hereby directed to formulate and implement an information program informing the general public and ensure the printing and distribution of this ordinance.

Section 22. **Appropriation** - To carry out the provisions of this ordinance shall attach the objectives thereof, there shall be included in the preparation of the annual executive budget a Special Children Fund, an appropriation which shall be used solely for purposes provided in this ordinance.

Section 23. **Separability Clause** - If for any reason or reasons, any part or portions of this Ordinance shall be held unconstitutional or invalid, other parts or provisions hereof which are not affected thereby shall continue to be in full force and effect.

Section 24. **Repealing Clause** - All ordinances, resolutions, executive orders and other measures which are inconsistent with any provision of this Ordinance are hereby repealed in modified according.

Section 25. **Effectivity Clause** - This Ordinance shall take effect upon completion of its publication and posting in at least two (2) conspicuous places.

Ordinance No. 2019-148

The Mendez-Nuñez Gender and Development Code of 2019

**CHAPTER I
GENERAL PROVISIONS**

Article I

Title, Statement of Policy and Definition of Terms

Section 1. Title: This ordinance shall be known and cited as the "Gender and Development Code of the Municipality of Mendez-Nuñez," hereinafter referred to as the GAD Code.

Section 2. Statement of Policy:

The GAD Code is an enforceable blueprint -- a concrete manifestation of the Municipal government's strong adherence to the to the fundamental democratic principle that men and women in a civil society are equal. This significant initiative is aimed at mainstreaming women's concerns, ensure the fundamental equality before the law of men and women, open a wider arena for their active participatory role in the development process, and provide women rights and opportunities equal to that of men.

The moral basis of this Code are those defined and declared by the United Nations to wit:

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1. Intensity awareness campaign on gender issues and concerns.
2. Strengthen Public-Private Partnership to maximize the effectiveness of programs and services addressing Gender and Development (GAD) concerns.
3. Encourage, support and expand the participation of government women in planning, implementation, monitoring and evaluation of development programs and projects.
4. Recommend appropriate curricula at all academic levels that are gender sensitive that passage of legislation.
5. Provide gender-responsive relief and rehabilitation programs with special focus on women and children's needs.
6. Include men in family planning programs, health and child care practices, concerns and engage them in projects that enhance the well-being of the family.
7. Upgrade and strengthen crisis intervention centers and shelters in the Municipality of Mendez-Nuñez for survivors of violence against women and children and other social conflicts.
8. Increase the numbers of women in decision and policy making posts in the locality through implementation of capability building programs.
9. Establish the necessary mechanism to enable women particularly the indigenous people to participate in development programs and gain access to non-traditional sources of livelihood, create financing, productive skills and labor saving technologies, and/or.
10. Ensure the contribution of women in all aspects especially in economic development is well accounted for.

Section 3. Definition of Terms

1. Barangay Protection Order - issued to prevent further acts of violence against a woman and/or her child and to grant other necessary relief. Its purpose is to safeguard the victim from further harm, minimize any disruption in the victim's life and facilitate the opportunity and ability of the victim to independently regain control of her life.

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1. Women have the right to the prevention of, and protection from all forms of violence and coercion against their person, their freedom, their sexuality and their participation.
2. Women have the right to freely and fully participate individually or collectively in the political processes of their communities and nation.
3. Women have the right to the access of enjoying their sexuality safely and securely.
4. Women have the right to the necessary knowledge and access for the full exercise of their reproductive choices according to their health and preferences.
5. Women have the right to equality of access to all state services and mainstreaming women's equality in programs, in its distribution, and should adequate support for housing and caring for their children.
6. Women have the right to an adequate, relevant and gender fair education throughout their lives from childhood to adulthood.
7. Women have the right to nurture their personal, collectively and individually, to secure an image of themselves as whole and valuable beings to build relationships based on respect, trust and mutuality.
8. Women have the right to adequate nutrition and proper healthcare.
9. Women have the right to humane living conditions.
10. Women have the right to nurture their parenthood, collectively and individually, to secure an image of themselves as whole and valuable beings to build relationships based on respect, trust and mutuality.
11. Women have the right to equality before the law, in principle and in practice.

This Code will provide the Municipal Government a policy direction to formulate programs and strategies that will include, among others, as:

1. Mainstream gender concerns in all local development plans, policies and programs.

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2. Harassment - a series of physical, emotional and physical abuse. It is repeated and habitual acts of violence as means of domination and oppression of the harasser's will and control over the victim's life. It encompasses the following kind of behavior that is not limited to:

- a. **Physical Abuse** - refers to acts that include bodily or physical harm.
- b. **Sexual Abuse** - this includes physical attacks on the victim's sexual organs or sexual sexual activity.
- c. **Psychological Abuse** - this includes forms of sexual violence against women or her family, including rape in the workplace, threatening or taking the children away, threatening deportation of women with foreign citizenship, threatening to kidnap children or other loved ones, another country, and forcing the victim to do degrading things. It may also include humiliating the victim's self or sexual activities, the use of foul words or statements and forms of abuse and oppression such as forcing the wife to have the workplace dressing. This provision shall likewise apply to common law relationships that does not include statements as contemplated in the Revised Penal Code, threatened and emotional destruction of property and personality the victim's identity.
- d. **Economic Abuse** - this includes deprivation of women of economic resources, their generation and substitution as well as create dependency and submissiveness and to any established structures of domination.

3. Bisexual - of a person who is romantically or sexually attracted to both men and women, or to people of various gender identities, or is related to both sexes.

4. Collateral Relative - next of kin who are not in the direct line of reference such as cousins.

5. Development - attaining a full and satisfying life for all regardless of age, sex, gender, tribe, race, creed and religion. It is characterized by an enrichment of Filipino indigenous resources of the country and freedom from dependency. It is therefore, sustainable, equitable and gender-responsive.

33. **Reproductive Health** - is a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being and not merely the absence of disease and infirmity, in all matters relating to the reproductive system and to its function and process. It comprises 10 elements namely:

- a. Maternal and Child Health and Nutrition
- b. Family Planning
- c. Prevention and Treatment of Reproductive Tract Infection (RTI) including STD, HIV and AIDS
- d. Prevention and Management of Abortion
- e. Education and Counseling on Sexuality and Sexual Health
- f. Prevention and Treatment of Infertility and Sexual Disorders
- g. Men's Reproductive Health
- h. Violence against Women
- i. Adolescent Reproductive Health
- j. Sex Trafficking

34. **Safe Home/Halfway Center** - a house or building used as a hiding place or temporary shelter for victims of abuse

35. **Sexuality** - is one's total expression of personhood on the basis of self-appreciation (body, mind and feelings) and satisfaction of needs, also considered as physical expression of intimate relationship with others through various life stages

36. **Sexual Harassment** - is a form of misconduct involving, as act or a series of unwelcome sexual advances, request for sexual favors, or other verbal or physical behavior of a sexual nature, made directly, indirectly or implied.

37. **Sole Parent** - any individual who falls under any of the following categories:

1. A woman who gives birth as a result of rape and other crimes against chastity even without a final conviction of the offender. Provided, That the mother keeps and raises the child.
2. Parent left sole or alone with the responsibility of parenthood due to death of spouse.
3. Parent left sole or alone with the responsibility of parenthood while the spouse is detained or is serving sentence for a criminal conviction for at least one (1) year.
4. Parent left sole or alone with the responsibility of parenthood due to physical and/or mental incapacity of spouse as certified by a public medical practitioner.

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5. Parent left sole or alone with the responsibility of parenthood due to legal separation or de facto separation from spouse for at least one (1) year, as long as he/she is concerned with the custody of the children.

6. Parent left sole or alone with the responsibility of parenthood due to declaration of nullity or annulment of marriage as decreed by a court or by a church as long as he/she is concerned with the custody of the children.

7. Parent left sole or alone with the responsibility of parenthood due to abandonment of spouse for at least one (1) year.

8. Unmarried mother/ father who has preferred to raise and care for his/ her child/ children instead of having them care in the state or give them up to a foster institution.

9. Any other person who solely provides parental care and support to a child or children.

10. Any family member who assumes the responsibility of head of family as a result of the death, abandonment, disappearance or prolonged absence of the parent or sole parent.

38. **Transgender** - is a general term applied to a variety of individuals, behaviors, and groups involving tendencies to vary from culturally conventional gender roles.

39. **Violence Against Women and their children** - any act of gender-based violence that results in or is likely to result in physical, sexual or psychological harm to women, including threats of such act, coercion or arbitrary deprivation of liberty, whether occurring in public or private life. It shall include but not limited to:

1. Physical, sexual and psychological violence occurring in the family and other close relationships, including beating, sexual abuse of female children in the household, marital rape, female genital mutilation and other traditional practices harmful to women, non-spousal violence and violence against women in the workplace.
2. Physical, sexual and psychological violence occurring within the general community, including rape, sexual abuse, sexual harassment and intimidation at work, in educational institutions and elsewhere, trafficking in women and forced prostitution.
3. Physical, sexual and psychological violence perpetrated or condoned by the State, wherever it occurs.

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4. Other acts of violence against women to include:

- violation of the human rights of women in situation of armed conflict, in particular murder, systematic rape, sexual slavery, and forced pregnancy;
- forced sterilization and forced abortion, coercive forced use of contraceptives, genital sex selection and female infanticide
- discrimination of poverty.

40. **Wellness Centers** - facilities having programs intended to promote and maintain a state of physical well-being for optimal performance and health.

Article II

Creation of Barangay and Municipal Gender and Development Committees and their Functions

2. Create and establish systems or surveillance, investigation and report to ensure effective and efficient coordination;
3. Institute policies and programs to protect women and children victims of trafficking and violence;
4. Undertake information, education and advocacy campaigns against trafficking in persons and VAWC.

Section 35. Enlightened Participation of Men in the Protection of Women's Rights

The Municipal Government of Marikina shall, through Gender and Development Office (GADO), design and support programs and services to educate and empower men on their role and obligations in the protection of Women's Rights. The GADO shall ensure representation of men in family programs to ensure that a effective pattern of women in family building.

Section 36. Programs for Survivors of Violence

The Municipal Gender and Development Office shall keep a record of all cases of all forms of violence involving women, men and children. The data shall be forwarded to the Office of the Mayor and the Sangguniang Bayan for policy determination.

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Section 37. The Family Dispute and Violence Committee

The Municipal Government of Marikina shall encourage the creation of the Family Dispute and Violence Committee under the Liaison, Implementation in family cases in family dispute.

Article V

Labour, Livelihood and Skills Participation

Section 38. Policy

The Municipal Government of Marikina shall:

1. Ensure that all departments and agencies shall design, create and implement their women-inclusive programs and projects that would provide access to economic, educational;
2. Provide equal access to women in employment and training programs;
3. Recognize the rights of women as provided by law.

Section 39. Participation of Women in Business, Commerce and Trade

The Municipal Government of Marikina shall, among others, support and provide for programs, projects and activities, the process and creation in the promotion of economic, commerce, development by strengthening production, livelihood and entrepreneurship in women.

Section 40. Representing and Main, Local and National Organizations

The Municipal Government of Marikina shall:

1. Provide mentorship and skills training, conduct seminars and other programs for the empowerment of women, and take up in support of women's social and economic development;
2. Undertake initiative to encourage women to actively participate in administrative functions and particularly in local and national programs.

Section 41. Banks, Financial Institutions and Cooperative Support System

All banks, financial institutions and cooperative shall encourage its employees, members for making women who are active in economic growth of women. This program ensures and provides for state-run banks of women.

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Section 42. Economic Independence of Victims/Survivors

The Municipal Government of Marikina shall:

1. Take particular interest in providing opportunities for employment to women victims of violence and abuse;
2. Advocate funds for socio-economic programs for women victims-survivors that include gender-responsive livelihood skills.

Section 43. Economic Independence of Women and Men with Disabilities

The Municipal Government of Marikina, consistent with the Magna Carta for Disabled Persons, shall encourage the empowerment of women and men with disabilities in order to protect and promote their rights and maximize their contribution to the attainment of socio-economic development.

Section 44. Facilities and Support Systems for all Employees

The Municipal Government of Marikina shall ensure the safety and health of women employees. The employer in appropriate cases shall:

1. Establish separate toilet rooms, lavatories for men and women and provide at least a dressing room for women;
2. Establish Women's Center in the workplace to temporarily store breastfeeding, child rearing and early childhood care for working parents while on their respective job.

Section 45. Monitoring System for Labor Standards

A institution shall be established in the Integrated Population, Gender and Development Office to monitor all efforts, agencies and establishments in compliance with the Labor Code, the provisions of this Code and existing laws.

Section 46. Employment Assistance Program

The Municipal Government of Marikina, in cooperation with the Department of Labor and Employment and the Public Employment Service Office (PESO), shall endeavor to assist poor students, the unemployed and the underemployed in seeking lawful employment.

Section 47. Municipal-Based Registration of Householders/Kasambahay

All the 24 barangays in the Municipality shall create up with an annual survey of domestic workers in their barangays to monitor cases of sexual harassment, sexual abuse and other forms of maltreatment. Households shall be required to make their householders/Kasambahay for identification and for other purposes. Employers must provide their householders/Kasambahay.

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Section 48. Local Governance

To increase women's participation in politics and government, the Municipal Government shall adopt various approaches and strategies focusing in women's:

1. Political/legal education for women from the grassroots to the upper levels of government;
2. Participation of women in policy and decision-making positions;
3. Gender sensitivity training for employees in the government.

Section 49. Public-Private Partnership (P.O., NGO) Participation

The Municipal Government of Marikina shall:

1. Strengthen Public-Private Partnerships to maximize the effectiveness of programs and services addressing GAD concerns;
2. Encourage representative and active participation of women in provincial, municipal and barangay institutions;
3. Provide and establish efforts to maximize equal participation of women and men in the institution of in vision and mission.

Section 50. National Women's Month Declaration of March 1 as WOMEN'S Day

Pursuant to the Declaration of the United Nations, March of every year shall be observed as National Women's Month and March 1 as Women's Day through an issuance of an Executive Order by the Municipal Mayor. A Women's Month shall be held every March, where issues and concerns relative but not limited to the promotion and protection of women's health, Women's Day and Women's Day shall be observed and observed by the Municipal Social Welfare and Development Office.

Section 51. National Children's Month

Pursuant to Proclamation No. 20 Concerning the month of October (every year) as the National Children's Month in Recognition of the Filipino Children as the Most Precious Asset of the Nation and their Vital Role in Nation-Building pursuant to Sec. 12, Art. II of the Constitution, dated September 26, 1975, the Municipality of Marikina shall observe the month of October as National Children's Month and undertake programs, projects and activities in the observance thereof. This ordinance shall be known as "An Ordinance Creating the Place and Venue for the Selling, Manufacturing and Regulating the Sale, Distribution, Possession and the Use of Firecrackers, Pyrotechnic Devices and Other Similar Explosives within the Territorial Jurisdiction of the Municipality of Mendez Reyes, Province of Cebu."

SECTION 4. Participation of concerned Entities - All concerned entities are hereby required to extend their utmost cooperation and contribute their share to ensure the successful implementation of this ordinance.

- Every business establishment is required to put up a trash can or waste bin for their solid waste.
- Fruit, meat and vegetable vendors inside the public market are also required to put up trash cans or waste bins in front of or beside their stalls to be managed and arranged by the market administration.
- Public Utility vehicles such as jeepneys and tricycles to place a trash or waste bin inside their vehicles.
- The Barangay shall likewise put up trash cans, waste bins or garbage receptacles in strategic places within the barangay to make sure, convenient and accessible for the public to place or deposit their waste items.

SECTION 5. Funding - To carry out the provision of this Ordinance, the source of PFR shall be taken from any available appropriation for supplies and materials for the purpose of the Ordinance in the barangay or other appropriate places within the community.

- In the event that the violator is caught by the barangay, any barangay official, City personnel (NPA) of the fine shall accrue to the general fund of the concerned barangay or the community service rendered right in the said barangay. Provided, however, the income derived out of the enforcement of the ordinance shall be utilized exclusively for clean and green program.

SECTION 7. Exemption - Except as otherwise provided in this ordinance, the following person shall be exempted from the coverage of this Ordinance, specifically on the penal provision.

- Persons who are mentally sick, disabled and those showing signs of having mental disturbance.
- Children below six (6) years old, however, if the child is under supervision by an adult, the latter shall be held responsible and accountable.

WHEREAS, the right of the general public to a clean and healthy environment can be assured by mandating all catering, restaurants and other food serving establishments to have a proper food-handling area and equipment;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED, that it is hereby RESOLVED by the Sangguniang Bayan of Mendez, Cebu, that the following Ordinance be passed, to be known as Ordinance No. 2019-155:

The offending parent shall not be released without the presence of his/her parents or guardian.

SECTION 8. Repealing Clause - All Ordinances, Resolutions or Decrees, which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed, amended or modified accordingly.

SECTION 12. Effectivity - This Ordinance shall take effect after compliance with the requirements on posting and publication.

Section 1. Title - The ordinance shall be known as AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING PROPER HANDLING, FACILITIES AND REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL CATERING, RESTAURANTS AND OTHER FOOD SERVING ESTABLISHMENTS WITHIN THE MUNICIPALITY OF MENDEZ, CEBU, AND PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF.

Section 2. Definition of Terms - It shall be the duty of the Sangguniang Bayan to ensure that all food serving establishments within the Municipality of Mendez, Cebu, comply with the following:

- Food-handling facilities - clean and safe food service system.
- Requirements - to have a proper food service system.
- Compliance - to have a proper food service system.

Section 3. Penalty - Any establishment, if caught by the Sangguniang Bayan violating this Ordinance, shall be liable to pay the following:

Section 4. The Municipal Health Office shall promulgate such rules and regulations, with the approval of the Office of the Mayor, or as necessary for the effective implementation of this ordinance.

Section 5. The Municipal Health Office and the BPO shall make the public aware of the ordinance by conducting public forum, seminars or information dissemination and poster.

Section 6. Repealing Clause - All ordinances, rules, regulations or parts thereof, which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed, amended or modified accordingly.

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SECTION 1. DECLARATION OF POLICY. The Municipal Government of Mendez-Nuñez shall promote the right food nutrition of its people as a vital part of human development and optimum function. It recognizes that all nutritional interventions should be anchored to the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) 2016 and the Philippine Plan of Action for Nutrition 2017-2022 in improving the quality of human resource base of the country.

The Local Government of Mendez-Nuñez aims to institutionalize its social services through programs that shall end all forms of malnutrition, including addressing the internationally agreed targets on stunting and wasting in children under 5 years of age and address the nutritional needs of adolescent girls, pregnant and lactating women and older persons, through:

- Increasing the agricultural productivity and incomes of small-scale food producers, family farmers and other productive resources and inputs, knowledge, financial services, markets and opportunities for value addition and non-farm employment
- Ensuring sustainable food production systems and resilient systems agriculture practices that increase productivity and production, that help maintain ecosystems, that strengthen capacity for adaptation to climate change, extreme weather, drought, flooding and other disasters and that protect soils, forests and water quality
- Adopting measures to ensure the proper functioning of food commodity markets and their derivatives and facilitate timely access to market information, including on food reserves, in order to help limit extreme food price volatility; and
- Accessing quality essential health-care services and support in safe, effective, quality and affordable essential medicines and vaccines for all

SECTION 2. DEFINITION OF TERMS. For the purpose of this ordinance the following terms are hereby defined:

- 1) **Breast milk substitute** means any food being marketed or otherwise represented as a partial or total replacement for breast milk, whether or not suitable for that purpose
- 2) **Complementary food** means any food, whether manufactured or locally prepared, suitable as supplement to breast milk, whether or not suitable for that purpose
- 3) **Exclusive breastfeeding** means providing breast milk as the sole source of nutrition for infants
- 4) **Infant formula** refers to breast milk substitute formulated substantially to meet normal nutritional requirements of infants up to six months of age and adapted to their physiological characteristics
- 5) **Lactation Stations** refers to a private, clean sanitary and well-ventilated room or area in the workplace or public places where nursing mothers can wash up, breastfeed or express their milk comfortably and store this afterwards

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- 6) **Food fortification** refers to the addition of micronutrients such as Vitamin A, iron and iodine to food, whether or not they are normally contained in the food for the purpose of preventing or correcting nutritional deficiencies with one or more nutrients in the population or specific population groups
- 7) **Philippine Plan of Action for Nutrition or PPAN 2017-2022** refers to the national government's strategic program to contribute to improving the quality of the human resource base of the country and to have substantial decreases in stunting and maternal and child health burden

ARTICLE 2 PROGRAMS AND SERVICES FOR NUTRITION

SECTION 4. NUTRITION PROGRAMS AND SERVICES. The LGU Mendez-Nuñez shall implement and sustain the Nutrition Program and Services. It shall adopt the nutrition framework of the Department of Health and other nutrition-related entities that has been proven and effective to address malnutrition.

4.1 PROMOTION OF INFANT AND YOUNG CHILD FEEDING. The LGU shall advocate and monitor, support and protect breastfeeding through early initiation within one (1) hour after child birth, exclusive breastfeeding for six months and introduction of complementary food from 6 months onwards in various settings like home, maternal and child health centers, barangay health centers, lactating facilities, and workplace to ensure safe and adequate nutrition for all infants and young child. It shall implement interventions such as follows:

- 1) Organization and continuous support holding of community-based or household support group (nutrition) groups in every barangay or urban and young child feeding
- 2) Training health and nutrition workers, including those in lactating facilities and in workplace, incorporating on infant and young child feeding
- 3) Setting up lactation stations in the workplace either government or private establishments with lactating mothers
- 4) Enforcement of the Milk Code or the Marketing of Breast Milk Substitutes (MTC)
- 5) Home fortification of complementary food through the use of nutrient-enriched powder
- 6) Creating ITC materials on Infant and Young Child Feeding (IYCF) concepts especially during breastfeeding month celebration in August every year
- 7) Integration of IYCF concepts in the curriculum of primary and secondary schools

4.2 MATERNAL AND CHILD CARE PROGRAM. The LGU shall support National Child Care Service Program which shall cater to the health of which affects the child in the womb with the end in the view of delivering a healthy child.

WHEREAS, due to the increased influx of vehicles and tourists, the City of Tagaytay has been experiencing traffic congestion during weekends and holidays;

WHEREAS, the Tagaytay Office of Public Safety conducted a dry-run of the One-Way Traffic Scheme covering the Tagaytay Nasugbu Road from the intersection of Tagaytay Nasugbu Road and J.P. Rizal Avenue (namely Mahogany Avenue (Hagdang Bato) and intersection of J.P. Rizal Avenue from the intersection of Tagaytay Nasugbu Road and J.P. Rizal (Petron Gas Station) during the recent Lenten season and surrounding weekends, the implementation of which has consistently yielded the desired positive results;

NOW THEREFORE, upon motion of Hon. Claudio C. Batino seconded by Hon. Sofronio E. Dimaranan, be it ordained by the Sangguniang Panglungsod of Tagaytay that:

SECTION 1. This ordinance shall be known as "One-Way-Traffic Scheme Ordinance" of Tagaytay City.

SECTION 2. The following re-routing scheme shall be implemented in the City of Tagaytay during weekends, holidays and during special events from 6:00 am to 5:00 pm:

All vehicles from Manila and from Batangas, Alfonso, Indang and Mender going to Tagaytay (Calamba Road) group in the Western portion shall take the J.P. Rizal Avenue (namely Mahogany), however, may turn left at Crisanto Delos Reyes Ave. corner Bato and Akle St. to and take a U-turn at Hagdang Bato/intersection of J.P. Rizal Avenue and Tagaytay Nasugbu Road going to Tagaytay Nasugbu Road.

All PUVs and PUBs from Batangas, Alfonso, Indang and Mender going to the Western portion shall take the J.P. Rizal Avenue (namely Mahogany), and may take a U-turn at Hagdang Bato/intersection of J.P. Rizal Avenue and Tagaytay Nasugbu Road going to Tagaytay Nasugbu Road.

All vehicles from Alfonso, Indang and Mender going to the Eastern

portion shall take the Tagaytay Nasugbu Road, however, may take a left turn at Akle Street and Crisanto Delos Reyes Avenue or may take a U-turn at Petron Station (intersection of J.P. Rizal Avenue and Tagaytay Nasugbu Road) going to J.P. Rizal Avenue.

All PUVs and PUBs from Batangas, Alfonso, Indang and Mender going to the Eastern portion shall take the Tagaytay Nasugbu Road;

All private vehicles from Amadeo going to the Eastern part shall turn right to J.P. Rizal Avenue (Mahogany) then may turn left at Akle St. or make a U-turn at Hagdang Bato/intersection of J.P. Rizal Avenue and Tagaytay Nasugbu Road going to Tagaytay Nasugbu Road.

All PUBs from Amadeo bound to Manila shall turn right to J.P. Rizal Avenue (Mahogany) then shall take a U-turn at Hagdang Bato/intersection of J.P. Rizal Avenue and Tagaytay Nasugbu Road going to Tagaytay Nasugbu Road.

All private vehicles from the Western Part going to Amadeo shall take the Tagaytay Nasugbu Road and shall turn left at Crisanto Delos Reyes Avenue.

SECTION 3. The speed limit of 50km/hour shall be observed on one-way streets during holidays, weekends and special events to avoid accidents.

SECTION 4. The Tagaytay Office of Public Safety shall formulate the Implementing Rules and Regulations in the implementation of this ordinance, specifically for all PUVs and PUBs.

SECTION 5. Operator or Driver of a motor vehicle (public or private) who have violated any provision of this ordinance shall be penalized by confiscation of driver's license and a fine prescribed hereunder;

1st Offense	-	Not exceeding Php1,000.00
2nd Offense	-	Not exceeding Php2,500.00
3rd Offense	-	Not exceeding Php5,000.00 or imprisonment not exceeding (3) months or both upon the discretion of the court.

SECTION 6. The Tagaytay City Component Police and the Tagaytay Office of Public Safety shall enforce this ordinance.

SECTION 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon approval.

AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING THE PLANTING
OF TREES IN THE CITY OF TAGAYTAY

AUTHOR: HON. ARTHENA BRYANA D. TOLENTINO

SPONSORS:

HON. DOSS ANWILA R. PAJO

EXPLANATORY NOTE:

Tree planting aims to raise awareness to the society in the importance of planting and saving trees, express our concern to the environment, and diminish the unfavorable effects of climate change.

NOW THEREFORE, upon motion of Hon. Arthema Bryana D. Tolentino, seconded by Hon. Joel B. Tiberan, be it ordained by the Sangguniang Bayan of Tagaytay that:

SECTION 1. This ordinance shall be known as "The Tree Planting Ordinance of Tagaytay City."

SECTION 2. DECLARATION OF POLICY. To protect and advance the right of the people to a balanced and healthful ecology; to recognize the importance of trees in ecological stability; to strengthen the cooperation between the Government and the public to prevent the loss of natural resources and restore our environment by requiring tree planting activities.

SECTION 3. SCOPE. This ordinance shall apply to the following:

1. Residential owners, contractors/developers securing occupancy permit.
2. Graduating students from elementary, secondary (Senior High Schools (public and private), and colleges/universities (public and private).
3. Couples applying for Marriage License.
4. Applicants for employment (securing Mayor's Permit).
5. Retiring City employees and officials (elected & appointed) of the City Government
6. Every household in the City of Tagaytay

SECTION 4. DEFINITION OF TERMS. For the purpose of this

ordinance, the following terms and phrases shall apply:

- a. Certificate of Occupancy - refers to a document by a local government agency or building department certifying a building's compliance with the National Building Code and other laws, and indicating it to be in condition suitable for occupancy.
- b. Marriage - either church or civil marriages.
- c. Trees - shall refer to ornamental, fruit bearing or forest trees at least three (3) feet tall.

SECTION 5. GENERAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS:

1. Planting Trees shall be one of the requirement for those securing the following:
 - a. Occupancy permit
 - b. Application for Marriage License
 - c. Graduation (elementary, secondary and tertiary)
 - d. Application for employment
 - e. Application for retirement/separation from service
2. The City Agriculture Office shall point out areas where applicants could plant trees including specification or kind of trees.
3. Applicants may provide their own trees or may purchase at the Office of the City Agriculture Office.
4. The tree planting activities shall be done in any of the following areas:
 - (a) Public school grounds, gardens or other available areas within the school premises;
 - (b) Idle or vacant public lands;
 - (c) Public parks in urban and rural areas and
 - (d) Private schools, parks and lands with the consent of the owner thereof.
 - (e) In designated areas by concerned Planning Barangay.
5. Applicants shall plant the following number of trees:

25	- for occupancy permit - residential
10	- for occupancy permit - commercial establishment
2	- for marrying couple
1	- for every graduating student
1	- for applicants for employment
5	- for retiring City employees/official of the City Government
1	- for every existing household (except those who have applied for occupancy permit)
6. Upon compliance, a certification shall be issued by the City Agriculture Office to applicants, said certification shall form part of their requirements.

SECTION 6. MONITORING & IMPLEMENTATION. The City Agriculture Office in coordination with CENRO shall monitor the implementation of this ordinance. A weekly report shall be submitted to the Au-

pose for information and monitoring.

A copy of this ordinance shall be furnished to the Engineering Office, the City Planning & Development Office, the Academic City Character Office, Human Resource & Management Office, the Association of Barangay Captains and developers.

SECTION 7. PENALTY CLAUSE. Non-compliance to this ordinance shall mean non-issuance of necessary permit or license to the applicant.

SECTION 8. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE. If for an reason, or reasons, any Section of this ordinance shall be held unconstitutional or invalid, other sections which are not affected, thereby shall continue to be in full force and effect.

SECTION 9. REPEALING CLAUSE. All other City ordinance which requires tree planting is hereby modified accordingly.

SECTION 10. EFFECTIVITY. This ordinance shall take effect upon approval.

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE POLICY FOR THE CITY GOVERNMENT OF TAGAYTAY

SPONSOR: HON. JOEL B. TIBAYAN
Committee on Health & Sanitation

WHEREAS, His Excellency, President Rodrigo Duterte, in his drive against illegal drugs, issued Executive Order No. 66 series of 2018, in actualizing the Philippine Anti-Ilegal Drugs Strategy (Pids);

WHEREAS, to ensure the successful implementation of the Pids, the Department of Interior and Local Government has issued Memorandum Circular No. 2018-113 dated 21 December 2018, Re: Dangerous Drugs Board Resolution No. 13 Series of 2018 Establishment and Institutionalization of Drug Free Workplaces Policies in all Government Offices, Including the Conduct of Authorized Drug Testing for Elective Local Official and Appointive Public Officers and For Other;

WHEREAS, the City Government has legal responsibility and management obligation to ensure a safe working environment among its employees and likewise to protect the public by ensuring that its employees have good physical and emotional stability in performing assigned duties;

NOW THEREFORE, upon motion of Hon. Joel B. Tibayan seconded by Hon. Claro C. Batino, BE IT ORDAINED by the Sangguniang Panglungsod of Tagaytay in session assembled that:

SECTION 1. It is hereby established A Drug-free Workplace Policy for the City Government of Tagaytay.

SECTION 2. SCOPE. This policy shall cover all employees of the City Government of Tagaytay notwithstanding their position as permanent, casual or service provider under a job order contract, elective and appointive public official.

SECTION 3. DEFINITION OF TERMS

a. **Authorized Drug Test** - the examination of a person's urine or blood serum in order to determine the presence of dangerous drugs. The testing shall be done in any government forensic laboratory or by any other drug testing laboratory accredited and monitored by DOH to safeguard the quality of the results. It shall employ among others, two (2) testing methods, the screening test, which will determine the positive result as well as the type of the drug used, and the confirmatory test, which will confirm a positive screening test.

b. **Challenge Test** - a drug test conducted in an authorized drug testing activity as a result of a challenge filed by a public officer who tested positive for drug use in a confirmatory test.

c. **Confirmatory Test** - an analytical test using a device, tool or equipment with a different chemical or physical principle that is more specific which will validate and confirm a positive screening test.

d. **Contract of Service/Job Order** - refers to employment covered by a contract pertaining to temporary work or services such as janitorial, security or surveillance services where no employer-employee relationship exists; piece of work or intermittent job of short duration not exceeding six (6) months; and a casual work all of which are not covered by Civil Service laws, rules and regulations, but covered by Commission on Audit rules; and the public officer or employee involved does not enjoy the benefits reserved by government employees, including but not limited to personal economic relief allowance, cost of living allowance, and representation and travel allowance.

e. **Dangerous Drugs** - including in those listed in the schedules annexed to the 1961 Single Convention on Narcotic Drugs, as amended by the 1972 Protocol, and in the Schedules annexed to the 1971 Single Convention

on Psychotropic Substances as enumerated in the attached annex which is an integral part of Republic Act No. 9165 or the Comprehensive Dangerous Drugs Act of 2002 as amended (the "Act").

f. Drug Dependency Examination – refers to the examination conducted by DOH accredited physician who evaluates a person's extent of drug use and determines whether he/she is a drug dependent or not. Examination includes history taking, intake interview, determination of criteria for drug dependency, detection of dangerous drugs in urine or blood through laboratory procedures, mental and physical state.

g. Chronic User/Drug Dependent – a person who is compulsive drug seeker, with continuous use despite harmful consequences and long-lasting changes in the brain.

h. Employee Assistance Program – a program for government officials or employees that offers assistance to those who have alcohol or drug-related issues and problems that may affect work performance. This program shall be implemented by the officers assigned in the LGU.

i. Experimenter – a person whose drug use began through exploration with limited exposure and no development of regular use or any related harm.

j. Mandatory Drug Testing – compulsory submission of a public officer or prospective employee to drug testing as mandated by the drug-free workplace policy of the LGU of Tagaytay City.

k. Occasional User – a person who indulges to drug use in order to create or enhance experience in any social setting.

l. Public Officer – any person holding any public office in the LGU of Tagaytay City by virtue of an appointment, election or contract.

m. Random Drug Testing – conduct of drug testing to all employees or any employee that resulted to equal probability from a group of employees without information as to when or where it will be done.

n. Screening Test – a rapid drug test performed to establish potential or presumptive positive result. It refers to the immunoassay test to eliminate a "negative" specimen i.e. one without the presences of dangerous drugs, from further consideration and to identify the presumptively positive specimen that requires confirmatory test.

o. Agency – refers to the Government Unit of Tagaytay City.

p. Workplace – a place where work is usually performed.

SECTION 4. PRE-EMPLOYMENT DRUG TESTING. Mandatory drug testing shall remain a requirement for employment. Any applicant found positive for drug use shall be denied to enter government service.

SECTION 5. ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

A. The City Administrator shall:

- i. Ensure the implementation of Drug-Free Workplace Policy in all departments of the agency and inform and provide copies to all Department Heads of the program.

- ii. Maintain a drug-free workplace.

- iii. Ensure adequate budget is allocated for the implementation of the Drug-Free Workplace Policy and Program

- iv. Ensure that the Drug-Free Workplace Committee and Assessment Team undergo regular training and are functional.

- v. Ensures the creation of Employee Assistance Program that will provide resources for and/or referrals to medical interventions for public officers who have alcohol or drug-related problems that may affect work performance.

B. The Drug-Free Workplace Committee shall:

- i. Conduct substance abuse awareness and prevention programs, medical and social risks associated with substance abuse.

- ii. Assures the maintenance of Drug-Free Workplace

- iii. Conduct mandatory and random drug testing

- iv. Actively involved in the implementation of Employee Assistance Program.

C. Assessment Team shall:

- i. Assist in the conduct of substance abuse awareness and prevention programs.

D. The City Legal Officer shall:

- i. Enact any legal actions stated in the drug-free workplace policy.

E. The City Public Officer/Employee

- i. Abide by the terms of the drug-free workplace policy.

- ii. Never use nor possess any drugs/substances classified as illegal by the DDB to his/her co-employees or other and/or to commit or aid in the commission of any unlawful acts Penalized under RA 9165.

- iii. Voluntarily seek for assistance and support in any event that they have problems/concerns related to dangerous drugs.

- iv. Help in the implementation and sustainability of Drug-Free Workplace in the agency.

SECTION 6. DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE PROGRAM

i. The Agency has the full authority to conduct drug testing in all public officers to prevent the entry of dangerous drugs in the workplace and use of dangerous drugs among personnel. The frequency shall be conducted in random taking into consideration the funding, number of personnel to be tested, nature of work and other logistics. All results shall be strictly confidential for whom only the Local Chief Executive, Head of the Department and members of the Assessment Team shall have access.

ii. Drug testing shall be done and conducted by an authorized drug testing laboratory accredited by the Department of Health.

iii. It shall consist of screening and confirmatory tests; the latter to be done only if the result of the screening test turned out to be

positive. The result of screening test will determine if a person is a drug user and as to the type of drug used while the confirmatory test confirms a positive screening test.

iv. A negative test result requires no further action and to the employee concerned while a positive drug test result from a confirmatory test shall immediately be relayed to the Local Chief Executive who shall notify the public officer concerned. After which, he/she has the right to challenge the result of the confirmatory test up to fifteen (15) days from receipt of positive result but it shall be done again in a DOH accredited drug testing laboratory. Expenses for the challenge shall be borne by the public officer concerned. However, all of the above shall be undertaken under conditions that will protect the employee's privacy and dignity.

v. In case the concerned employee with a positive result did not take the challenge on the prescribed time, the positive result of the confirmatory test shall be considered final. On the other hand, a positive drug test from the challenge test will be considered final and the agency shall take appropriate administrative action.

vi. All drug test results shall be attached to 201 File of all Public Officers and shall be held strictly confidential.

SECTION 7. Mandatory Drug Testing - is a compulsory submission of a public officer or prospective employee to drug testing as mandated by a drug-free workplace policy of the City of Tagaytay.

1.1 Mandatory drug testing (by urine test) for all public officers shall be done annually.

1.2 The HR Team shall notify the Head of the Department the mandatory drug testing for all of its employees on the day that it will be accomplished. In case an employee is absent on the said date, he/she shall be submitted to an unannounced schedule one he/she gets back to work.

1.3 Employees shall be instructed to proceed to the DOH accredited drug testing facility chosen by the agency where they will accomplish and sign the consent for and submit urine sample for examination.

1.4 After the conduct of drug test, employees are required to go back to their posts and resume their work.

1.5 All results shall be submitted to the head of the HR Department and not to the person who underwent the drug test. Head of HR will then inform the LCE of the results.

SECTION 8. Random Drug Test - conduct of drug testing to all officers or any employee from a random or equal probability from a group of employees without discrimination as to when or where it will be done.

8.1 Random Drug testing shall be done without prior notice to randomly chosen employees or to those employees who are suspected to be using dangerous drugs.

8.2 A maximum of 10 percent (%) of the employees shall be sub-

jected to random drug testing but previously selected and newly hired employees shall be excluded from the sample if they were just subjected to drug test for the past 6 months.

6.3 Same procedure as mandatory drug testing follows.

SECTION 9. EMPLOYEE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM - A public officer can voluntarily seek assistance with the Employee Assistance Program prior to the conduct of authorized drug testing for proper intervention. It shall provide referrals and other needed services by the public officer concerned. The CHO or any Clinician who was trained on drug dependency examination can conduct such in order to determine the level of Substance Use Disorder and the proper intervention needed. However, such assistance shall not apply to public officers who were found to be positive for drug use only after the conduct of a confirmatory test.

SECTION 10. DRUG DEPENDENCY EXAMINATION - refers to the examination conducted by a DOH accredited physician who evaluates a person's extent of drug use and determines whether he/she is a drug dependent or not. This examination is done in aid of their treatment conducted for free by the CHO or any private physician trained on such examination. In such case, fee shall be shouldered by the employee.

Examination includes history taking, intake interview, determination of criteria for drug dependency, detection of dangerous drugs in urine or blood through laboratory procedures, mental and physical state.

c.1 EXPERIMENTER

c.1.1 While still in public service, public officer shall undergo a six (6) months counselling on his own expense.

c.1.2 Counselling should be done by a trained counsellor or psychiatrist.

c.1.3 If counselling is done during office hours, time spent shall be deducted against his/her leave credits.

c.1.4 After the six month period, a certificate of completion shall be secured and submitted to the head of the HR.

c.2 OCCASIONAL USER

c.2.1 While still in public service, public officer shall undergo counselling and monthly drug testing six (6) months without fail on his/her own expense.

c.2.2 Counselling should be done by a trained counsellor or psychiatrist and drug testing should be done in a DOH accredited facility.

c.2.3 If counselling is done during office hours, time spent shall be deducted against his/her leave credits.

c.2.4 After the six month period, a certificate of completion shall be secured and submitted to the head of the HR.

c.3 CHRONIC USER/DRUG DEPENDENT

- c.3. I shall undergo continuous rehabilitation and treatment for a minimum period of six months in a government rehabilitation facility, DOH accredited rehabilitation facility, or through a community rehabilitation program authorized by DBB.

However, if the employee is found positive on drug testing with this evaluation result, a penalty of dismissal from service shall be imposed even from a first offense according to Rule 10 of the 2017 Rules of Administrative Cases in the Civil Service.

D. MONITORING - Implementation of the policy and programs of the Drug-Free Workplace of the LGU of Tagaytay City shall be executed by the Committee on Drug-Free Workplace and Assessment Team.

- Reports that include the following shall be regularly submitted to the Dangerous Drugs Board and DILG:

- a. number of officials and employees subject to drug testing
- b. those found positive for drug use; and
- c. action undertaken by the Committee on those found positive for drug use.

SECTION 11. The Local Chief Executive shall issue an Executive Order on the Composition and Functions of the Drug-Free Workplace Committee and Assessment Team.

SECTION 12. SANCTIONS

1. Administrative offense of Grave Misconduct or Gross Insubordination of Public Officials and Employees shall be provided corresponding penalties due to the following reasons (based from Revised Rules on Administrative Cases in the Civil Service, December, 2011; Sec. 60 of the Local Government Code and Article 124 (3) of the Implementing Rules and Regulations of the Local Government Code):

A. Grave misconduct - punishable by dismissal from government service.

1. Officials and employees found to have used dangerous drugs during the prescribed period of their intervention or rehabilitation.
2. Public officials and employees who are not issued a certificate of completion (in the case of experimenter and occasional user) or a certificate of completion with clearance (in case of chronic user/drug dependent)
3. Public Official or employee who, after being tested positive of drug use, shall refuse to undergo treatment or rehabilitation, or fails to complete his/her treatment or rehabilitation program.
4. Appointive or elective public officer who was found positive for drug use after the conduct of a confirmatory test in an authorized drug Testing activity.
5. Any public officer found to have tampered the result of a drug test,

interfered with the conduct of the drug test or in the release of drug test results, or violated rules of confidentiality of records.

B. Gross Insubordination - is punishable by suspension of six months and one (1) day to one year for the first offense and dismissal from service for the second offense. This administrative punishment shall be applied to anyone who refuses without any valid reason, to submit himself/herself for drug testing.

II. Procedure

The Legal Office of the Agency shall be considered in the imposition of penalties to any public officer found to have committed administrative liabilities.

SECTION 13. FUNDING. The City Government, thru the City Health Office shall ensure annual funding for the implementation of this ordinance.

The barangay drug testing for the barangay officials, employees and job order personnel shall be shouldered solely by the Barangay and must also be part of their budgetary appropriation.

SECTION 14. DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE POLICIES IN BARANGAYS - Every Barangay within the City of Tagaytay shall establish their respective Workplace Policies.

SECTION 15. CONFIDENTIALITY

All results of the drug test shall remain confidential and secured at the office of the HR Head. Any person who intentionally or unintentionally violated the confidentiality of the results shall be prosecuted for violation of Section 32, Article II of the Act.

SECTION 16. REPEALING CLAUSE

All ordinances, resolutions or laws of local application and effect inconsistent hereto are hereby modified, superseded, and repealed accordingly.

SECTION 17. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE

If, for any reasons, any part of provision thereof shall be held unconstitutional or invalid, other parts or provisions hereof which are not affected hereby shall continue to be in full force and effect.

SECTION 18. SUPPLEMENTARY CLAUSE

On matters not provided in this ordinance any existing applicable laws and their corresponding implementing rules and regulations, executive orders and relevant issuances issued therefore shall be applied in a supplemental manner.

SECTION 19. EFFECTIVITY

This Ordinance shall take effect upon approval and compliance to the mandatory posting and publication requirement prescribed under R.A. 7160 otherwise known as Local Government Code of 1991.

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE SELLING AND USING/RELEASING OF ALL KINDS OF FLYING GAS BALLOONS AND SKY LANTERN IN ALL OUTDOOR CELEBRATION WITHIN THE CITY OF TAGAYTAY

SPONSOR: HON. LOIS ANGELA R. PALO

Committee on Environmental Protection & Sanitation

WHEREAS, According to the Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000, RA 9003, Chapter 6 Penal Provisions Section 48. Prohibited Acts - The following acts are prohibited: (1) Littering, throwing, dumping of waste matters in public places, such as roads, sidewalks, canals, streams or parks, and establishment, or causing or permitting the same;

WHEREAS, releasing of flying gas balloons and sky lanterns outdoor causes littering; furthermore, balloons are biodegradable wastes which take years to break down; may release chemicals to the environment, while latex balloons primarily affect animals and mylar/foil balloons can cause dangerous power outages and spark fires;

WEHEREAS, there is a need to pass a policy banning the selling and using/releasing of all flying gas balloons and sky lanterns at any single outdoor celebration, promotional activity, sporting events or even during burial ceremonies and other public event within the territorial jurisdiction and airspace of the City of Tagaytay;

NOW THEREFORE, upon motion of Hon. Lois Andrea R. Palo, seconded by Hon. Athena Bryana D. Tolentino, **BE IT ORDAINED** by the Sangguniang Panlungsod of Tagaytay City that:

SECTION 1. Title - This ordinance shall be known as "An Ordinance Prohibiting the Selling and Use or Outdoor Release of all Flying Gas Balloons and Sky Lanterns in all Occasions within the City Of Tagaytay."

SECTION 2. Scope - This ordinance shall cover all barangays, public and private establishments, outdoor celebration, promotional activity, sporting events or even during burial ceremonies and other public events in the City of Tagaytay.

SECTION 3. Declaration of Policy - The City Government shall protect and advance the right of the people to a balanced and healthful ecology and to ensure a more conducive environment.

SECTION 4. Prohibited Act - The selling, using or releasing of any flying gas balloons and sky lantern at any single outdoor celebration, promotional activity, sporting events or even during burial ceremonies and other public events is hereby prohibited.

SECTION 5. Monitoring and Implementation Ordinance - the City Environment and Natural Resources Office (CENRO) and Business Permit and Licensing Office (BPLO) shall monitor the effective implementation of this Ordinance.

SECTION 6. Penalties - The following fines and penalties shall be imposed in violation of this ordinance.

A. For any person (natural or juridical)

- 1st offense - Php300.00
- 2nd offense - Php500.00 plus 1 day community service
- 3rd offense - Php1,000.00 plus 2 days community service

B. For establishments, the owner or manager

- 1st offense - Php1,000.00
- 2nd offense - Php3,000.00
- 3rd offense - Php5,000.00 plus closure of business

SECTION 7. Effectivity - This Ordinance shall take effect upon approval.

AN ORDINANCE PREVENTING AND CONTROLLING EMERGENCY OF DENGUE CASES IN THE CITY OF TAGAYTAY

Committee on Health

WHEREAS, Section 16 of the Local Government Code states that every Local Government Unit shall exercise the powers expressly granted those necessarily implied therefrom, as well as the powers necessary, appropriate or incidental for its efficient and effective governance, and those with essential to the promotion of the general welfare; Within their territorial jurisdiction, local government units shall ensure and support, among others things, the preservation and enrichment of culture, promote health and safety, enhance the right of the people to the balance ecology;

WHEREAS, the City of Tagaytay and its respective barangays are mandated by the Local Government Code to promote health and safety of its constituents by providing measures to prevent and control the spread of diseases that include Dengue;

WHEREAS, Dengue is the fastest spreading vector borne disease in the world endemic in one hundred (100) countries including the Philippines;

WHEREAS, Dengue can be prevented and controlled, it is important that the community is provided with a community-based Dengue Prevention and Control Mechanism and improves the existing policies implemented by the LGU;

NOW THEREFORE, upon motion of Hon. Athena Bryana D. Tolentino, seconded by Hon. [blank], be it ordained by the Sangguniang Panglungsod of Tagaytay that:

SECTION 1. This ordinance shall be known as, "The Dengue Prevention and Control Ordinance of the City of Tagaytay."

SECTION 2. Scope. This ordinance shall be applied to all residential homes (within the barangay and subdivisions), schools (public and private), business establishments and other public/government facilities within the jurisdiction of Tagaytay.

SECTION 3. ESTABLISHMENT OF BARANGAY DENGUE BRI-

GADE. All Barangays shall create a Barangay Dengue Brigade to conduct activities to prevent and control Dengue in their respective barangays which shall be composed but not limited to:

A. Composition

Chairperson	Punong Barangay
Members	Midwife/Nurse
	Barangay Councilors
	BIW
	Parents Leaders
	Barangay Teachers
	Day Care Teacher
	NGOs

B. Duties and Responsibilities:

1. Conduct 4 o'clock habit and 4-5 Kontra Dengue and Aksiyon Barangay Kontra Dengue in their respective barangays including schools, private establishments and subdivisions.
2. Inspect schools (public and private), residential homes (including subdivisions) and even establishments for larval survey.
3. Engage the participation of all households and the public and private actors in massive information dissemination and larval survey, search and destroy operations.
4. Conduct clean up drive in the barangay once a week.
5. Conduct information dissemination for the prevention and control of Dengue and reproduce IEC materials on Dengue to be distributed to the populace of the barangay.
6. Immediate reporting of Dengue cases to the CECU Section of the City Health Office.
7. Perform other functions on the prevention and control of Dengue that may deem necessary.

SECTION 4. The City Health Office shall perform and monitor the following:

1. Conduct monitoring and evaluation of the activities of Barangay Dengue Brigade.
2. Conduct surveillance of cases.
3. Conduct logging and misting activities when necessary.
4. Provide technical assistance, logistics and support to all barangays.
5. Provide immediate management for suspected Dengue cases.
6. Analyze larval survey report and develop strategies on Dengue Control and Prevention.

SECTION 5. Funding. Funds necessary for the Dengue Control and Prevention Program shall be funded under the City Health Office.

SIXTH This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon approval.

AN ORDINANCE MANDATING THE REMOVAL OF ALL OBSTRUCTIONS ON PUBLIC ROADS AND HIGHWAYS IN THE CITY OF TAGAYTAY

Commissioner on Public Works and Infrastructure

WHEREAS, Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG) Region IV-A Memorandum Circular No. 2019-18 dated May 22, 2019, reiterates the removal of all obstruction on public roads and highways in LGU's territorial jurisdiction and for the strict enforcement of the required road easement;

WHEREAS, Presidential directive during the 16th State of the Nation Address of the President is to clear roads of illegal structures and construction wherein all local officials are enjoined to exercise their powers essential to reclaim public roads which are being used for private ends and in the process, rid them of all illegal structures and construction;

WHEREAS, all Local Chief Executive are directed/ordered to remove all obstruction on public roads and highways such as electrical poles,

support wires and other wires and facilities owned by utility companies such as MERALCO, PLDT, and other telecommunication companies;

NOW THEREFORE, upon motion of Hon. Blanca Carmilita L. Pellicer seconded by Hon. Marcelito A. Acosta, be it enacted by the Sangguniang Panglungsod of Tagaytay that

SECTION 1. TITLE. This shall be known as AN ORDINANCE MANDATING THE REMOVAL OF ALL OBSTRUCTIONS ON PUBLIC ROADS AND HIGHWAYS IN THE CITY OF TAGAYTAY

SECTION 2. SCOPE. This ordinance shall cover all public roads, access/diversion roads and highways in the City of Tagaytay

SECTION 3. DECLARATION OF POLICY

1. All obstruction shall be removed on all National Highways, City and Bypass Roads.
2. Sidewalks and walkways shall be cleared of all illegal structures and parked vehicles.
3. "No Parking Area" for all kinds of motor vehicles including motorized bicycles on all National Highways, City and Bypass Roads.

SECTION 4. DEFINITION OF TERMS

Building materials - refers to any material which is used for construction purposes, such as clay, rocks, sand, and wood.

Double parked - refers to a vehicle parked beside a row of vehicle already parked parallel to the curb.

Obstruction - refers to something that obstructs, blocks or interferes with an obstacle or channel.

Public roads - refers to any road or street open to public travel under the jurisdiction of and maintained by the City Government of Tagaytay.

Scaffolding - refers to a temporary structure on the outside of a building, made usually of wooden planks and metal poles, used by workers while building, repairing or cleaning a building.

Signboards - refers to a sign with information on it or showing the name of a business, school, hospital.

Utility poles/poles - refers to a pole used to carry telephone wires and other utility lines above the ground.

Vendors – refers to a person or company offering something for sale or maybe traders in the street.

SECTION 5. GENERAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

1. The City Engineering Office is hereby directed to remove all roof loadings, builders materials, signboards, advertisements and promotions constructed along easements.
2. The BFLO shall make inspection of businesses applying for permit for mendas and sari-sari stores; and shall not issue permit if the business will cause obstruction on barangay/city roads and the national highway.
3. The Tagaytay Office of Public Safety and the Tagaytay City Component Police and Barangay Officials shall post NO PARKING ZONE signages; shall strictly implement the loading and unloading zone; and shall tow all illegally parked and/or double parked vehicles.
4. The Tagaytay Office of Public Safety, the Tagaytay City Component Police, Barangay Officials and Barangay Tanods shall:
 - Not allow hawking or peddling and vendors to ply around the national roads/highways;
 - Advise removal of all obstructions on all city and barangay roads;
 - Apprehend all violators of this ordinance.
5. The City Administrator's Office shall request Meralco, PLDT and other communication companies to relocate all posts/poles along the roads as per DILG Memorandum Circular No. 2019-121 and DILG R-4A Memorandum 2017-19(Removal of all obstruction on public roads and highways in LGUs territorial jurisdiction and for the strict enforcement of the required road easement).

SECTION 6. SANCTIONS. Penalties – The following fines and penalties shall be imposed in violation of this ordinance.

C. For any person (natural or juridical)

- 1st offense - not to exceed Php1,000.00
- 2nd offense- not to exceed Php2,00.00 plus 1 day community service.
- 3rd offense - not to exceed Php3,000.00 plus 2 days community service.

D. For establishments, the owner or manager

- 1st offense - Php3,000.00
- 2nd offense - Php5,000.00

3rd offense

Php5,000.00 plus suspension of business operation

Section 21, Ensignment

SECTION 7. REPEALING CLAUSE

Parking Areas, or Traffic Management Code shall be repealed accordingly.

SECTION 8. EFFECTIVITY

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon approval of this ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE IMPLEMENTING AFRICAN SWINE FEVER

PREVENTION AND CONTROL WITHIN THE CITY OF TAGAYTAY

AUTHOR & SPONSOR: HON. LORENA S. TOLEDO

WHEREAS, African Swine Fever (ASF) is a part of disaster that possibly happens and strike anywhere if the infection will not be contained and controlled to one place, the need to mobilize the Disaster Management and the City Government to assist the City Agriculture Office in the implementation of ASF Control and Prevention Measure.

NOW THEREFORE, upon motion of Hon. Lorena S. Toledo, seconded by Hon. Reynoso M. Esperto, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE SANGGUNIANG PANLUNGSOD THAT:

SECTION 1: TITLE - This Ordinance shall be known as "An Ordinance Adopting and Implementing the African Swine Fever (ASF) Prevention and Control in the City of Tagaytay".

SECTION 2: PURPOSE - This Ordinance is enacted for the purpose of preventing and controlling possible entry/outbreak of ASF in the country.

SECTION 3: OBJECTIVES AND PURPOSE

1. To prevent the entry of ASF, thus ensuring public safety;
2. To protect the local hog industry; and
3. To promote and protect the health, safety, and general welfare of the residents.

SECTION 4: SCOPE & COVERAGE - This Ordinance shall be enforced within the territorial jurisdiction of Tagaytay City.

SECTION 5: DEFINITIONS - For the purpose of this Ordinance, the following terms and phrases shall apply:

African Swine Fever refers to so called warthog fever, highly contagious and usually fatal viral disease of swine that is characterized by high fever, lesions, leukopenia (abnormally low count of white blood cells), elevated pulse and respiration rate, and death within four to seven days after the onset of fever.

Indemnification Fund - a fund required to pay the value of hogs per head in case of epidemic outbreak. All pigs within one (1) kilometer radius will be culled simultaneously to prevent further spread of infection.

Hogs - a domesticated pig, especially one over 120 pounds (54 kg) and trained for slaughter.

SECTION 6: CREATION OF THE LOCAL AFRICAN SWINE FEVER TASKFORCE - The ASF Prevention, Control Taskforce shall be

Council and shall be the main authority to oversee the implementation of the provisions of this Ordinance and other related activities as maybe provided in rules and regulations, and guidelines promulgated by higher authority as mandated by the national laws. It shall be composed, but not limited to the following:

Members	Chairman, Committee on Agriculture
	City Health Officer
	City Agriculturist
	PNP Commander
	ABC President
	One (1) NGO Representation
	City Action Officer/Information Officer

SECTION 7. CENSUS. The Local Government of Tagaytay thru the Office of the City Veterinarian/City Agriculture Office shall conduct a census of all hogs and piggeries within the City.

SECTION 8. PROHIBITION OF POSSESSION, OFFER FOR SALE AND/OR SALE. It shall be prohibited for any person to possess, offer for sale, engage in trade or have in possession any infected swine.

SECTION 9. ROLE OF BARANGAY OFFICIALS (Barangay Council on Agriculture)

1. Assist the Agricultural Technician in disseminating information to all hog raiser in respective barangays on the proper swine management practice required to avoid the recurrence of infection.
2. Report to the City Agriculture Office the incidence of any abnormality being noticed to swine within their area of jurisdiction.

SECTION 10. ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

1. The City Agriculture Office shall regularly submit a monthly report to the Local Chief Executive on existing backyard piggery and the Provincial Veterinarian. Surveillance must be conducted monthly in backyard commercial farming to avoid susceptible hogs.
 2. The Local PNP shall enforce movement control of hogs, farm equipment and feeds from the source of infected hogs.
1. In the event of ASF outbreak, the City Government shall conduct a culling operation.

SECTION 11. PROVISION OF INDemnIFICATION FUND. In the event of the outbreak has been declared or 20% of the population has been affected the expenses for massive culling of hogs in the barangays, disinfection, materials, workers and disinfectant to be used for cleaning and disinfection of

the pig pens/piggeries after the elimination of infected animals and the value of (hog) animals to be culled shall be taken from the Quick Response Fund (City Disaster Risk Reduction Fund).

The amount of Five Thousand (P5,000.00) per head of swine shall be paid to hog raisers to compensate for animals that are killed during the culling operations.

SECTION 12. PENALTY. Any violation of this Ordinance by any person, firm, meat seller and backyard farm owners shall be liable to prosecution and upon conviction, shall be subject to cancellation of business permit, a fine of not less than One Thousand Pesos (P1,000.00) but not more than Ten Thousand Pesos (P10,000.00), or imprisonment of not less than two (2) months but not more than one (1) year or both, upon discretion of the Court. In case of a corporation/commercial hog raisers if found liable, the officers will be held liable.

SECTION 13. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE. If any section or provision of this ordinance is declared invalid, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected by such declaration.

SECTION 14. EFFECTIVITY. This ordinance shall take effect upon immediately upon approval.

ARE DEFECTIVE CAUSING NOISE, REGULATING THE BLOWING OF HORNS BY ALL VEHICLES WHETHER PUBLIC OR PRIVATE AND PENALIZING OWNERS OR DRIVERS THAT CONTRIBUTE TO NOISE POLLUTION WITHIN THE CITY OF TAGAYTAY

WHEREAS, exhaust system of motor vehicles with modified mufflers and loud automobile horns has been the subject of numerous complaints because it causes undesirable/irritating sounds that leads to distraction and even accidents. Further, loud muffler noise agitate drivers as it affects hearing, vision, reaction time and judgment thereby increasing the risk of danger for everyone on the road, likewise, causes disturbance to people during nighttime in residential areas;

WHEREAS, one of the cause of noise pollution attributed to a large number of two-wheeled and three wheeled vehicles and other vehicles with modified pipes and mufflers thundering through streets and neighborhoods causing disturbance to people;

NOW THEREFORE, upon motion of Hon. Athena Bryana D. Tolentino, seconded by Hon. Marcelo A. Austria, be it ordained by the Sangguniang Panlungsod that :

SECTION 1. TITLE. This ordinance shall be known as "An Ordinance Prohibiting the Use of Noisy Mufflers and Regulating the Blowing of Horns by All Vehicles, Whether Public or Private Within the City of Tagaytay and Penalizing Owners or Driver that Contribute to Noise Pollution within the City of Tagaytay.

SECTION 2. DEFINITION OF TERMS

Exhaust System – refers to piping used to guide reaction exhaust gases from a controlled combustion inside an engine

Horns – refers to a sound-making device that can be equipped to motor vehicles. The sound made usually resembles a "honk" (older vehicles) or a "beep" (modern vehicles).

Motor Vehicles – refers to two-wheeled or three-wheeled vehicles (motorcycles and tricycles), automobiles and trucks.

Muffler – refers to a device for reducing the noise emitted by the exhaust of an internal combustion engine.

Noise Pollution – harmful or annoying levels of noise

SECTION 3. PROHIBITED ACT. The following are hereby strictly prohibited within the City of Tagaytay

- 3.1 All motor vehicles with modified pipes and mufflers causing loud noise.
- 3.2 Blowing of horns while passing schools, hospitals, churches and places of worship.

SECTION 4. EXEMPTIONS. Ambulance, Barangay Patrols, PNP Mobile cars responding to emergency cases are hereby exempted from the provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 5. GENERAL ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

5.1 The City Government through the General Services Office and the City Engineering Office will provide the necessary signages for the strict implementation of the ordinance.

5.2 The Tagaytay Office of Public Safety and the Tagaytay City Component Police shall implement this ordinance.

SECTION 6. PENALTY CLAUSE. Any person found violating this ordinance shall be penalized as follows :

- 1st Offense - Fine not exceeding P1,000.00
- 2nd Offense - Fine not exceeding P3,000.00
- 3rd Offense - Impounding of Vehicle

SECTION 7. REPEALING CLAUSE. All prior ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed or modified accordingly.

SECTION 8. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE – If any section or provision of this ordinance is declared invalid, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected by such declaration.

SECTION 9. EFFECTIVITY CLAUSE. This ordinance shall take effect fifteen days upon publication or posting in conspicuous places.

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Firm seeks gov't nod for 2 reclamation projects

Integrated property and infrastructure developer DM Wenceslao & Associates Inc. (DMW) has proposed two massive reclamation projects, including a 400-hectare reclamation off Manila Bay fronting its flagship estate Aseana City and the neighboring Philippine Amusement & Gaming Corp. (Pagcor) Entertainment City.

The other proposal is for the reclamation of 335 ha of offshore island in Sangley in preparation for the development of the Sangley International Airport.

Based on proposals submitted to the government through the Philippine Recla-

mation Authority, the government is expected to receive 200 ha at zero cost out of the two reclamation projects.

The proposal in Parañaque is seen to serve as an extension of the previous agreements that the government had with DMW, where the latter was given rights on the frontage of its completed reclamation project, DMW disclosed to the Philippine Stock Exchange.

"We look forward to continuing our work with the government to strengthen the country's development activities," DMW chair Delfin Wenceslao Jr. said.

"This 400-ha re-

clamation project is in line with our thrust to contribute to nation-building. Today, DMW's completed reclamation project in Parañaque City houses numerous entertainment, gaming and tourism destinations, which have become a key driver of growth in the country. It is where Aseana City and Pagcor Entertainment City now stand and where the recently opened Ayala Malls Manila Bay is located."

The proposed project in Sangley, Cavite, is undergoing review by the Office of the President, the Department of Transportation and Department of Finance, the disclosure said.

Nike's sales get boost from direct-to-consumer strategy

Nike's quarterly results again beat Wall Street expectations, as its online sales grew and customers shrugged off a series of corporate scandals.

The company's revenues grew to \$10.33 billion in the second quarter ending Nov. 30,

up 10% from the same period last year. Analysts had been expecting \$10.1 billion in revenue, according to Zacks Investment Research.

Nike's North America sales, however, disappointed slightly at \$3.98 billion, up 5% from \$3.78 billion dur-

ing the same period last year. Analysts had anticipated sales closer to \$4 billion, according to FactSet.

Nike's shares fell \$1.95, or almost 2%, to \$99.18 in after-hours trading.

Its net income rose 32% to \$1.12 bil-

lion. Strong sales, a lower tax rate and a focus on selling more shoes at full price helped offset cost increases related to tariffs. Earnings per share rose to 70 cents, beating expectations of 58 cents per share, according to Zacks.

It was Nike's first

earnings reporting since announcing that CEO Mark Parker will step down early next year. He will be replaced by board member John Donahoe, who formerly ran e-commerce company eBay and was tapped to push forward Nike's digital transfor-

mation.

The Beaverton, Oregon-based company has focused on building up its direct-to-consumer business through its own website, app and stores. The company launched a subscription service for children's shoes last summer.
